If I had opted to make any predictions in early March, I would have said the walleyes would be on the shorelines spawning the 1st week of April and that crappies would be biting very early this spring, but Mother Nature put an abrupt end to that line of thinking during the second week of March with temperatures dropping back to -10 degrees every night.

As we head into April, ice fishermen are getting their last shot at panfish before open water fishing begins. My advice is to wait for open water - no fish in the world is worth risking your life for and this is one of the most treacherous times to try ice fishing. I gave up ice fishing when my black lab fell through the ice about three feet from my tip-up, in the middle of **Stone Lake**, on February 23rd of this year. As the warm sun melts the snow and surface ice, it becomes more difficult to tell good ice from bad ice. When the ice becomes dark gray or black this time of year it's a good time to start rigging your boat, because open water is not far away.

Normal ice-out on the Manitowish Chain is around the 15th of April, give or take a week, and some of the greatest crappie fishing of the season usually follows. **Wild Rice, Clear, Fawn, Island, Stone and Rest Lakes**

all have excellent populations of slab crappies and are all good choices to try.

Wild Rice Lake is usually one of the first lakes to open and the old cabbage weed by the inlet and outlet areas are prime spots as well as the center weed bar. In **Clear Lake** fish the three weedy bays on the west shore, plus the bay across from the public landing. In **Fawn Lake** you will find old cabbage in most bays and along the east and west shorelines. In **Stone Lake** try the shallow weeds behind Fox and Beaumont's Islands. In **Island Lake**, the inlet area by the **Manitowish River** and the inlet area of **Rice Creek** are both prime crappie areas. In **Rest Lake** try the weeds and stumps on the north end where **Papoose Creek** enters.

Circle Lily Lake and Dead Pike Lake also have good crappie populations, but it's usually May before they start to turn on.

Small 1/64-oz. or 1/32-oz. tube jigs, suspended by a small float and fished on 4 lb. line is by far the most productive in white, pink/white or yellow/white. Pinkies, twisters, beetle spins, etc. plus small crappie minnows all work well, but the tubes always seem to be the number one producing bait on the chain.

April is a frustrating month for fishermen. Ice fishing is over and the open water sport fishing season has not yet arrived. However, here in Boulder Junction there are many opportunities for the early season hook and line fishermen.

Some of the very best bluegill and crappie fishing for the entire year happens just after ice-out. Start fishing the small shallow lakes, as they will be the first to become free of ice. Crappies can be found in large numbers, in shallow (3' to 6') muddy bottom bays or mud flats with patches of last years growth of musky cabbage, as well as some new growth scattered throughout the area. Most of the time you can see these fish sunning themselves near the surface.

These fish can easily be caught using a bobber and a 1/32-oz. or 1/16-oz. tube jig or twister-tail. Small minnows on a plain hook suspended from a bobber also work very well, if they won't touch the artificial bait.

Some good choices for spring crappies in the Boulder Junction area are **Lower Allequash, Upper Gresham, Round and Little Crooked**.

On **Lower Allequash** fish just out from the bullrushes and wild rice that cover the west shore and also the



weeds just off the entrance from **Upper Allequash**. On **Upper Gresham** try the weeds on the south shore, to the East of Harmony Point and also the weeds by the outlet to **Middle Gresham**, also the weed bar in front of Stonegate Resort. **Round Lake** usually produces a lot of nice slabs in the cabbage just out from the boat landing, by the rock point on the north side and also by the cabbage just out from the mouth of **Rice Creek** on the southwest end of the lake. On **Little Crooked** try the weeds just out from the entrance of **Rice Creek**, the bull rushes on the west shore and also the cabbage on the south shore in front of Evergreen Lodge.

If it's walleye you're after, Boulder Junction is the only town in this area where you can fish for them year around. The Department of Natural Resources operates a research area on **Escanaba Lake**, just East of Highway M, where the season never closes and there is no restriction on bag or size limits.

Small minnows fished on a 1/32-oz. or 1/16-oz. jig or slip bobber rig, along the rocky shore-lines will produce the best catches. **Escanaba Lake** also has northern, musky and panfish and the season is also open for them as well. Remember to pick up your free fishing permit at the Escanaba station before fishing. State fishing license is also required.

For quality fishing, whatever the season, practice catch and release all year 'round.

I had the occasion, this last winter, to sit down with two of my friends and demolish a huge platter full of Crappie filets. The breeding was very light, the seasoning was nearly absent, and the taste was sublime. It was impossible to say "no" when the platter moved in front of me. What a meal! And these fish were caught from Van Vliet Lake in the spring while numerous other boats around us were coming up empty. How did that happen? Pretty simple, light was right.

Springtime is widely known to be the best time to ambush these prolific spawners. Most people know that bullrushes and shallow water gravel bars and stone covered shorelines are the places to find them. So why do a lot of people "strike out" when they go after them? They just go "too big". Their rods are usually Walleye rods with 6, 8, or 10-pound test line. The reels correspond to that size line, and the lures or baits have to be "heavy" to make these combos work. Bad choice!

The proper tackle for springtime Crappie should allow a

fisherman to present the correct sized lure or bait in a manner that induces the fish to strike. Pretty simple stuff, but few people will take the time to do this "balancing act".

What bait or lure do they prefer at this time? Crappie minnows on a number 10 hook suspended below a slip bobber probably take the biggest percentage of "old Slabsides". Easy fishing! Just keep looking along the banks and bullrushes and brushpiles. Change the depth of the setting occasionally, move very slowly, keep a fresh minnow on the hook and enjoy what you're doing. It's really that simple!

Remember, these fish have a "paper" mouth. When you set the hook simply lift up on the rod tip. You have to be more concerned about setting too severely rather than not enough. Then play the fish to your net and "in the ice box". There is no doubt about the fact that fish stored on ice will be better table fare. Make it a habit.

Another very successful way to catch Crappie is with ultra small spoons or jigs. Little fluttering spoons that need only a touch to make them undulate are great Crappie lures. Of course, you need an ultralight rod and reel, 2 or 4-pound test line, Polarized glasses, and a little "touch" to use the rig right; nothing that a little practice can't accomplish! Then get on the bow of your boat and hunt the shallows. Look in the bullrushes, brush piles, and gravel edges for those "shadows" and, when you find them, cast that spoon past them and bring it back right through them. Not too fast. It's still cold water so they won't be big chasers. Nice and easy is the answer.

One good thing about the Crappie is their prolific reproduction. If even a small lake is not decimated by crowds of anglers it will naturally produce good numbers of Crappie for a long time.

So have some fun when the ice breaks up. And think ahead to next winter when the fruits of your labor will refresh both your taste buds and your memories.

And have enough patience to enjoy your "time on the Water".

It's the first of April and only a month to go until the opening of the game fish season. What to do? The signs of spring are everywhere, budding trees and plants, the birds are starting their nesting activities. It's time to talk about spring panfishing.

The Lac du Flambeau area lakes offer abundant crappie and perch fishing. Remember this, always check out the smaller lakes first. **Buckskin, Moss, Gunlock, Amik and Squaw** should be some of the first to check on. Warming water is the key and always look to the north ends of these for first activity as they tend to warm the fastest. SOLAR ENERGY will bring these slab crappies out of their haunts and start them into their spawning mode.

The approach I use is tiny 1/32 or 1/64-ounce jigs with tubes. Bait Rig's mini Slo-Poke jigs fit this bill very well. The quivering legs on the tubes body are irresistible to crappies this time of year. Floral colors such as chartreuse, orange or hot pink work exceptionally well, but don't be afraid to try different colors if they become finicky. Tipping these jigs with a small fathead minnow will also help to increase action at times.

If jigs fail to give you action, try a small minnow on a plain hook and split shot suspended from a slip bobber. Crappies eyes are located toward the top of their head, so it's always better to present the bait a little above their line of sight. With a little trial and error you can usually find the depth these fish are active in.

Key locations to find crappies in the spring are bays that contain last years weeds and the new fresh green weeds just peeking through. Stumps and overhanging trees are also good spots to check out. Big reed beds are key spawning areas to spend some time in also. Don't overlook the fish cribs that are scattered throughout the Flambeau chain. A series of these cribs exist on **Long-Interlocken Lake** as well as **Flambeau Lake**. Check them out. A quiet approach is essential in locating schooling crappies. Whether you use your electric motor or the oars, always approach these areas slowly.

Squirrel Lake is a favorite of mine for spring crappies. Try the weed bed just out from the landing for some nice slabs. **Pokegama** and **Crawling Stone Lakes** on the **Flambeau Chain** offer some excellent panfish action as the water warms also. Remember that the north ends of the lakes are a key in first fish activity and **Pokegama's** north end has a lot of nice 4 to 10-foot weed beds.

If it's perch you're after, try the deeper water on **Flambeau, Fence, Crawling Stone** and **White Sand Lakes**. Perch tend to stay deeper prior to spawning and will be found

on the deeper weed edges of these lakes. The key again is warming water. Find this and you've located your active fish. Check the surface temperature frequently. Warm water pockets spell fish.

Tiny jigs and small minnows prove to work best, but if you have access to wigglers from the ice-fishing season use them. Perch are suckers for these little morsels.

Don't let the month of April be a month you sit and stew, when you can go out and have some fun catching crappie and perch. There is nothing better than a fresh meal of panfish out of very cold water. Remember, Kids and panfishing go hand in hand and it's a great time to spend some quality time teaching the younger generation how to catch fish. We can really make a difference in educating our next generation in the skills of fishing and the overall enjoyment that fishing can give each one of us.

Next month the **WALLEYE** season will start and I will give you some hot tips on some Flambeau area lakes. Sharpen those jig hooks and respool those spinning reels so you're ready for those **SPRING EYES!**

With bartending at Sky View Supper Club in Presque Isle almost every night and manufacturing "Boonie Baits" every day, guess what? I'm not ready; Line to change, reels to clean & oil, tackle boxes to clean and straighten, boat to clean, motor to tune-up — seems to me that I went through this last year and the year before that. I don't know how, but I always seem to be ready when that "MAGIC DAY" arrives.

"Ice-out" usually occurs in the Mercer area sometime between the 10th and 15th of April. Although the game fish season is closed until Saturday May 2nd, some excellent crappie action can be found in the Mercer area, starting around the 20th of April.

Some of the best waters in the Mercer area will be

Cedar Lake, Mercer Lake, Echo Lake, Fischer Lake
and, of course, the **Turtle-Flambeau Flowage.**

As the water warms this time of the year, the "slabs" will move up into the shallow bays and cabbage weed beds. Easy pickin's - use ultra-light outfits rigged with fresh 4 to 6-lb. test line, 1/64-oz. or 1/32-oz. jigs tipped with plastic tails or minnows and you're all set.

Last season was mediocre for large fish in all species - so I'm fully expecting this year to be much better than average.

I'm coming out with several new designs in lures this year, that I know you'll be more than satisfied with. Give them a try. This season will be "action packed" with lots of BIG FISH! (Am I positive or what?)

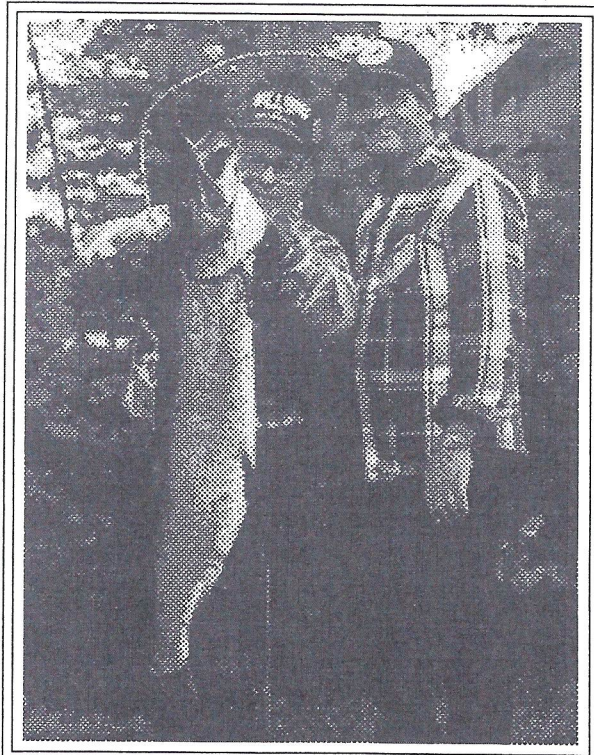
NEW FOR 92 VILAS COUNTY MUSKY MARATHON ADDS GUIDE'S DIVISION, RELEASE PATCHES

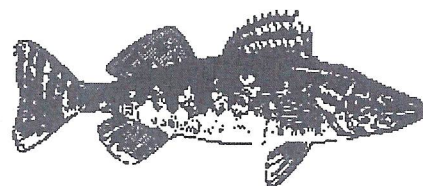

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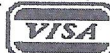
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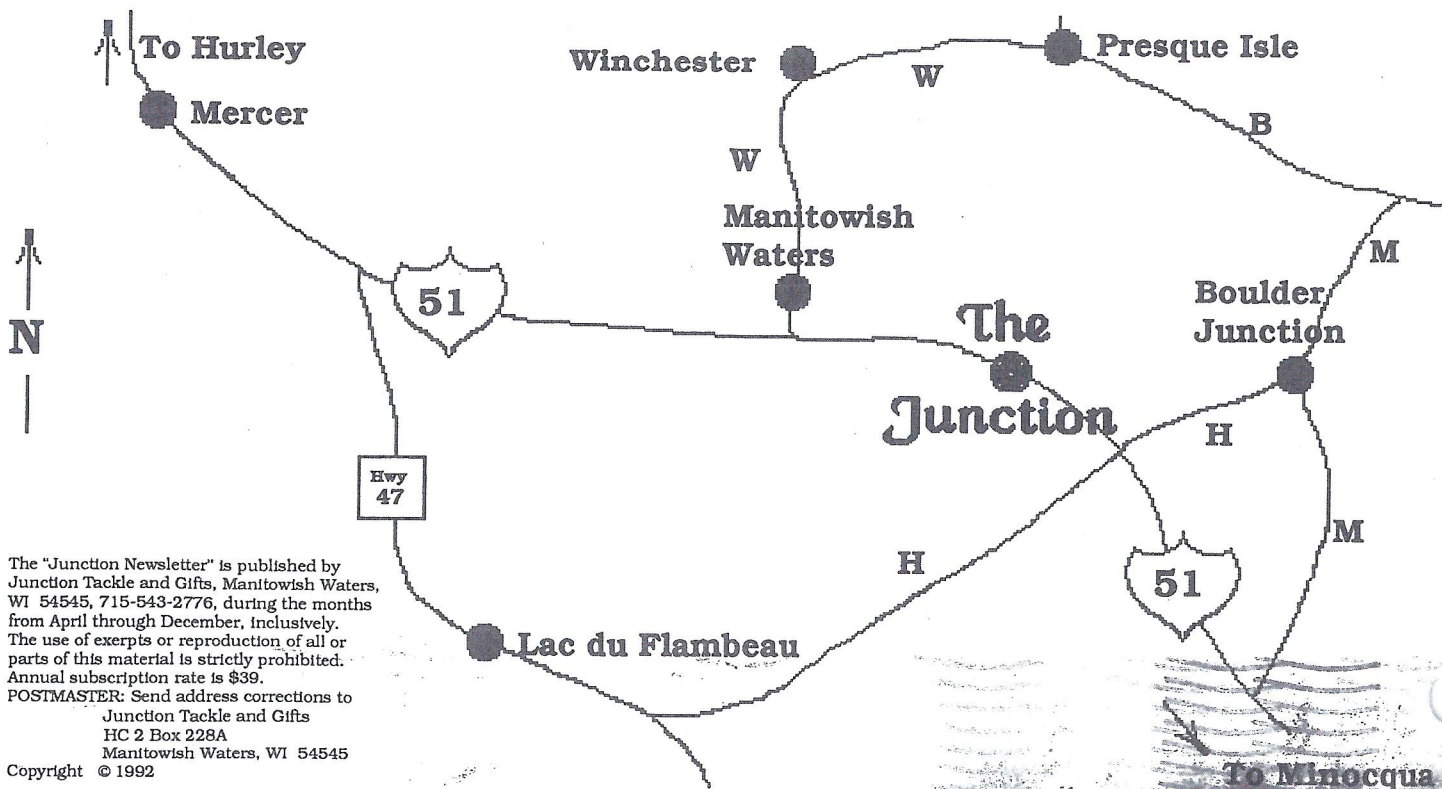
