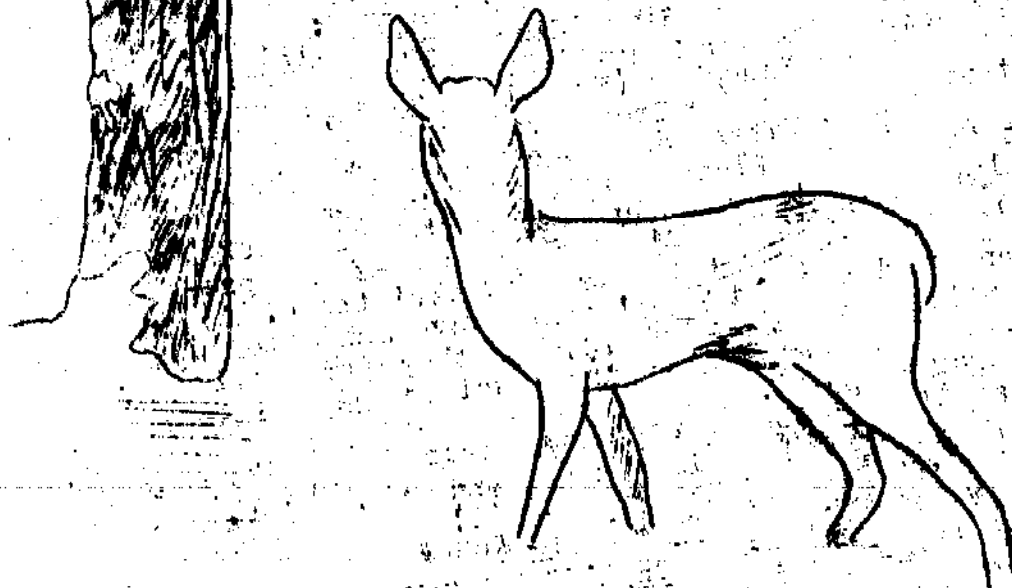

EMERGENCY CONSERVATION WORK
Office of the Director
Washington, D. C.

Robert Fechner, Director of Emergency Conservation Work, today announced that a total of 26,684 enrolled members of the Civilian Conservation Corps had been awarded first aid certificates by the American Red Cross during the months of September, October, November, and December, 1934. The men receiving certificates were graduated from the first aid schools, which were established in the CCC camps on a nation-wide basis last August. Before receiving the certificates in first aid, each man was required to pass an examination upon completion of the standard fifteen-hour course of instruction prepared and issued by the Red Cross.

The First Aid courses are given under the supervision of War Department medical officers in cooperation with the American Red Cross. The regulations prescribe, that each class should be taught by an instructor holding a card of appointment from the American Red Cross authorizing him to conduct first-aid work. Examination blanks as well as instructors' outlines are supplied by the Red Cross. At the completion of each course, the company commander in charge of the CCC camp submits a list of graduates to the War Department.

"Every camp has trained first aid men to assist in caring for those, who are injured", Mr. Fechner said today in discussing the first aid phase of the CCC accident prevention program. "The purpose of first aid are threefold: first, to prevent accidents, by making the enrollee see an accident in terms of possible pain to himself, his fellow enrollee or his pocket book; second, to equip him with sufficient knowledge to determine the nature and extent of the injury and third, to train him to do the proper thing at the proper time and to know what not to do. These graduates, with their knowledge of dressings, bandages, treatment of poisons, care of snake and spider bites, the stopping of bleeding and the reviving of victims of drowning, electrocution or gas asphyxiation, will more readily be acceptable to places in industry."

Commenting on the CCC safety program, Harold F. Enlows, Director of the First Aid and Life Saving Service of the American Red Cross, recently made the following statement:

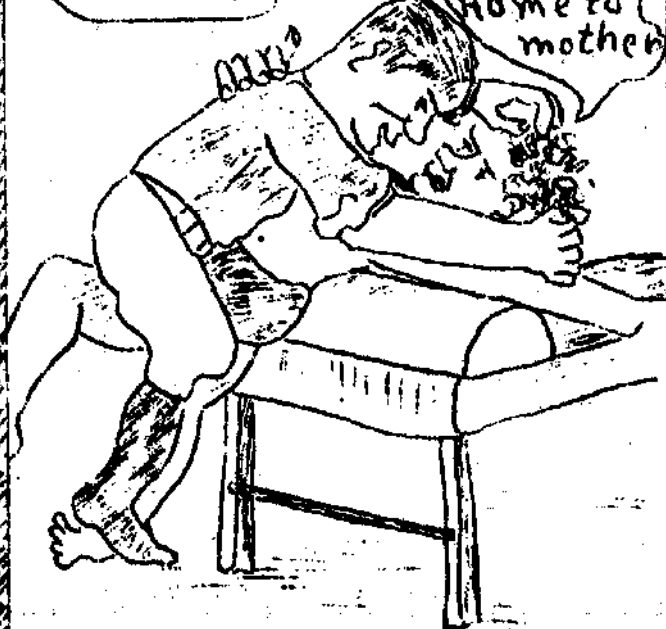

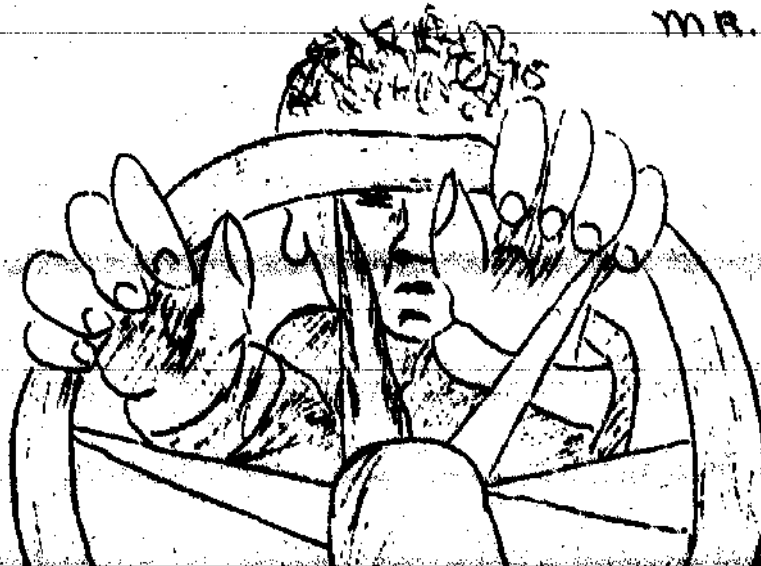
