

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESS  
 Office of the Director  
 Washington, D. C.  
 April 25, 1935

The machinery for expansion of the CCC to a peak strength of 600,000 men was set in motion today by President Roosevelt. At his direction, Robert Fechner, director of Emergency Conservation Work, called upon all cooperating departments to push ahead plans for building the CCC to 600,000 men by August 31. The War Department promptly sent out instructions to commanding officers of all corps areas directing them to begin the enrollment of new men on June 15 and to have all men in forest camps by the end of the final week of August. To carry out the program on schedule time, it will be necessary for the Labor Department and the Veterans' Administration to select and the War Department to enroll 250,000 new men and estimate 100,000 replacements during the months of June, July, and August. To house the new men, the War Department will construct 1,276 new forest camps as promptly as possible. When the program is complete the CCC will consist of 600,000 men working out of 2,916 camps distributed throughout 48 states and the District of Columbia. The present authorized strength of the CCC camps is 353,000. The number of camps in operation is 1,640.

One important change has been made in the rules of eligibility. Under the expansion program, the age limit for juniors, which is now from 18 to 25 years, will be changed to 18 to 28 years. The time which a junior may remain in the CCC camps has been lengthened from 12 months to 18 months.

The quotas each state will be entitled to send to the CCC camps are to be based 50% on the population of the states according to the 1930 census and 50% on the basis of the number of families actually on relief in each state.

According to War Department officials, the CCC expansion program represents one of the greatest peace time tasks ever handed the Army. The expansion program will greatly increase the duties of all cooperating agencies, Director Fechner said. "The huge task of supply, enrollment, transportation, welfare and camp administration will, as heretofore, be handled by the Army. To command the camps, the War Department will call to active duty some 3,000 additional reserve officers, bringing the total number of reserve officers on CCC duty to between 9,000 and 10,000.

The work which these men will perform will prove of great benefit not only to our national forests and national parks, state forest, private forest lands and large acres of agri-

 Cups of purple, rose, and gold.



Sundays & Holidays —




