CAMP IMPROVEMENTS

A general face-lifting has been conducted about Camp the past month and will be continued until renovations have been completed. Landscaping, constructing, and tearing down old landmarks have changed the features of Company 660 a great deal during this period.

Numerous flowers have been planted in the beds which were prepared about the Camp Area for this purpose. Grass seed was sown about the Area recently. A large number of small Xmas trees were planted about the reveille grounds, while larger trees were transplanted in the quadrangles.

The telephone and power poles have been removed from the Camp Area proper and placed on the outside of the Camp. This has done much to give the Camp a neater appearance and also seems to have enlarged the grounds.

The screen doors were placed on all the buildings in preparation for the prospective raids of our old foes, the mosquitoes, flies, and other insects.

The warehouse in old Barrack 1 has been shortened by eight feet to give the Rangers additional space for their living quarters.

The section of the old kitchen which protected the old ice-box has been moved to the new kitchen. It is to be made into a baking kitchen. The old ice-box has been moved to the Mess Hall and has been converted into a closet for the china-ware. (continued on pp. 7)

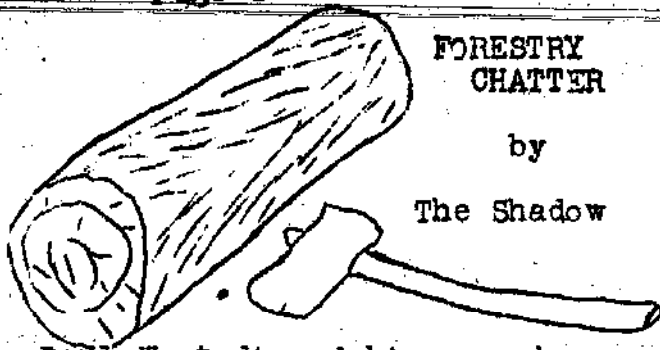

WHITE PINE TO
BE PROTECTED FROM BLISTER RUSTLarge Disease
Control Program Planned

A preliminary survey has been made and as soon as the weather permits work will be started to protect several thousand acres of heavily stocked white pine from the blister rust disease.

During 1935 while eradicating the European black currants in Vilas County, it was found that the fatal blister rust disease had spread into numerous unprotected areas in this County.

Blister rust is a fungus disease that attacks and kills white pines. The spores from infected pines have been found to spread over one hundred miles by means of air currents. These spores cannot infect healthy pines, but must first develop and multiply on the leaves of currant and gooseberry bushes. They are then again spread by air currents to begin their work of killing the white pine.

Experiments have proven that under normal conditions in Wisconsin if these spores from the currant and gooseberry bushes travel through the air over 900 feet they are killed. The only way that the beautiful stands of white pine in Vilas County can be saved from excess damage is by destroying all wild and cultivated currants and gooseberry bushes up to 900 feet from the pine stands.

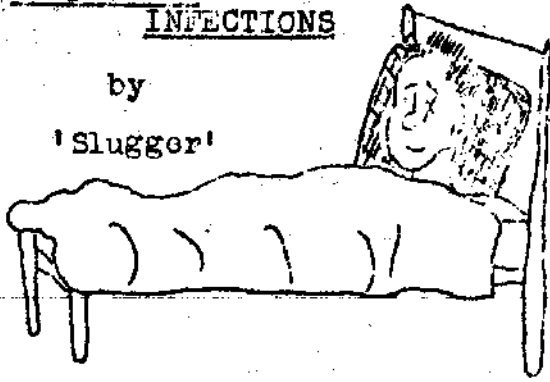
To assure effective control the white pine area must be systematically cleared of all bushes. A crew of trained men supervised by an experienced foreman examines all of the ground in parallel strips and marks the edge of each strip by dropping a string line, so that no portion of the ground will be overlooked or needlessly reworked.

During the summer this work will be done by Civilian Conservation Corp men as part of the Emergency Conservation Work program in cooperation with the Wisconsin Conservation Department and the U. S. Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine. The work is supervised by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture and Markets.

Anyone desiring information or assistance with disease control problems is asked to contact R. G. Bartlein, Disease Control Foreman at the Star Lake Camp, or H. W. Rahmlow, Jr. Plant Pathologist at Manitowish, or by contacting a member of the State Forestry Department.

EDUCATIONAL NOTES

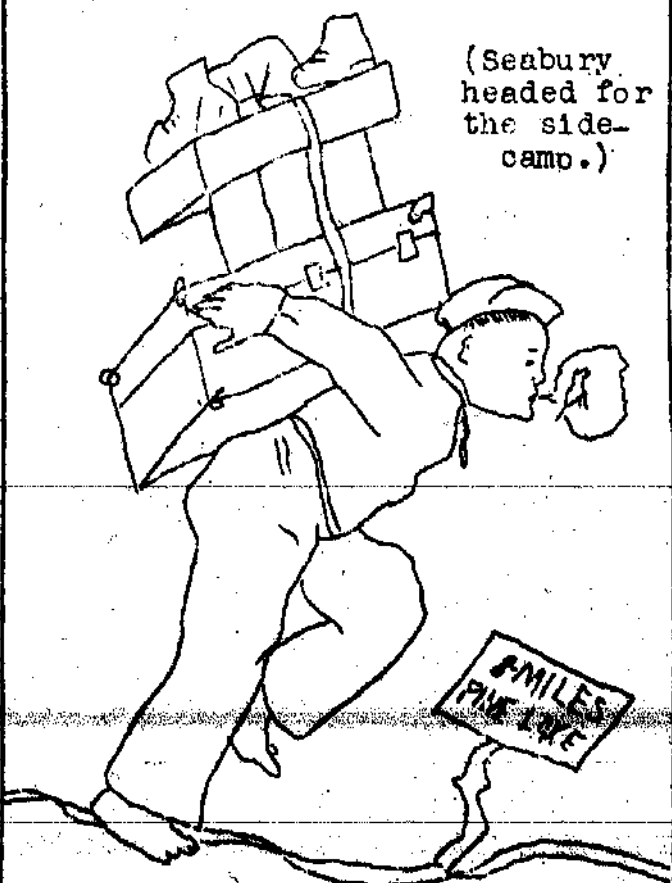

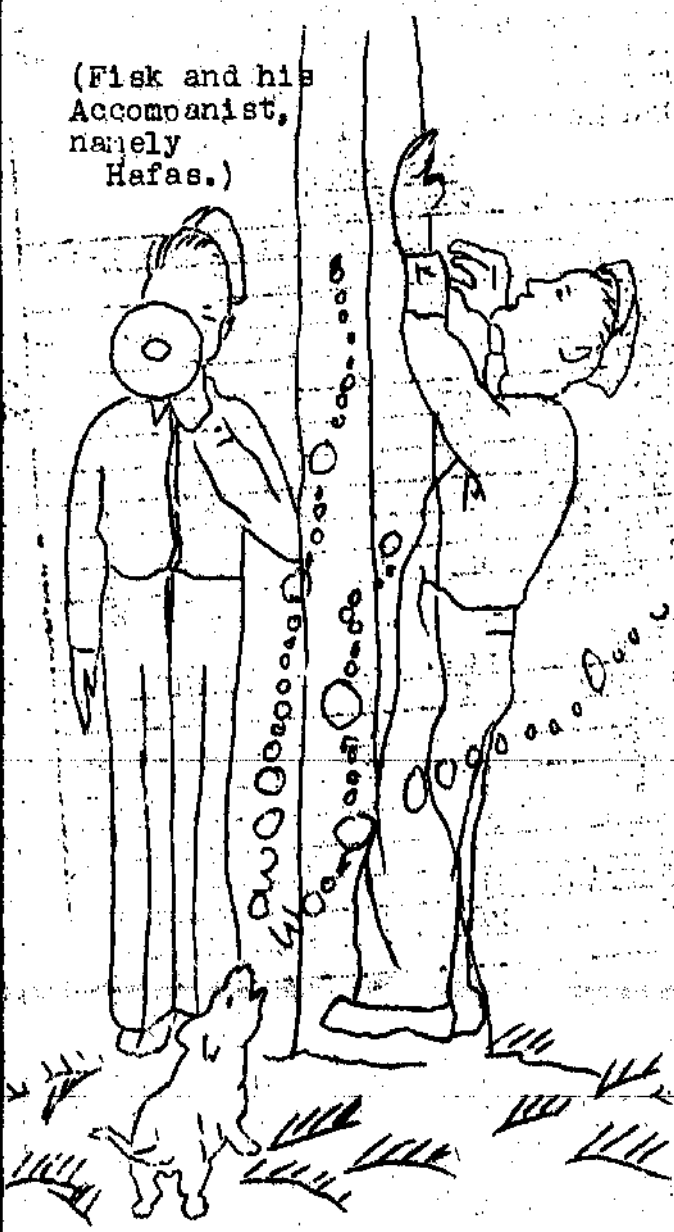
'Ossie' Koepen tells of a camping trip to the North woods when the mosquitoes were so big and ferocious that, but let him tell it.

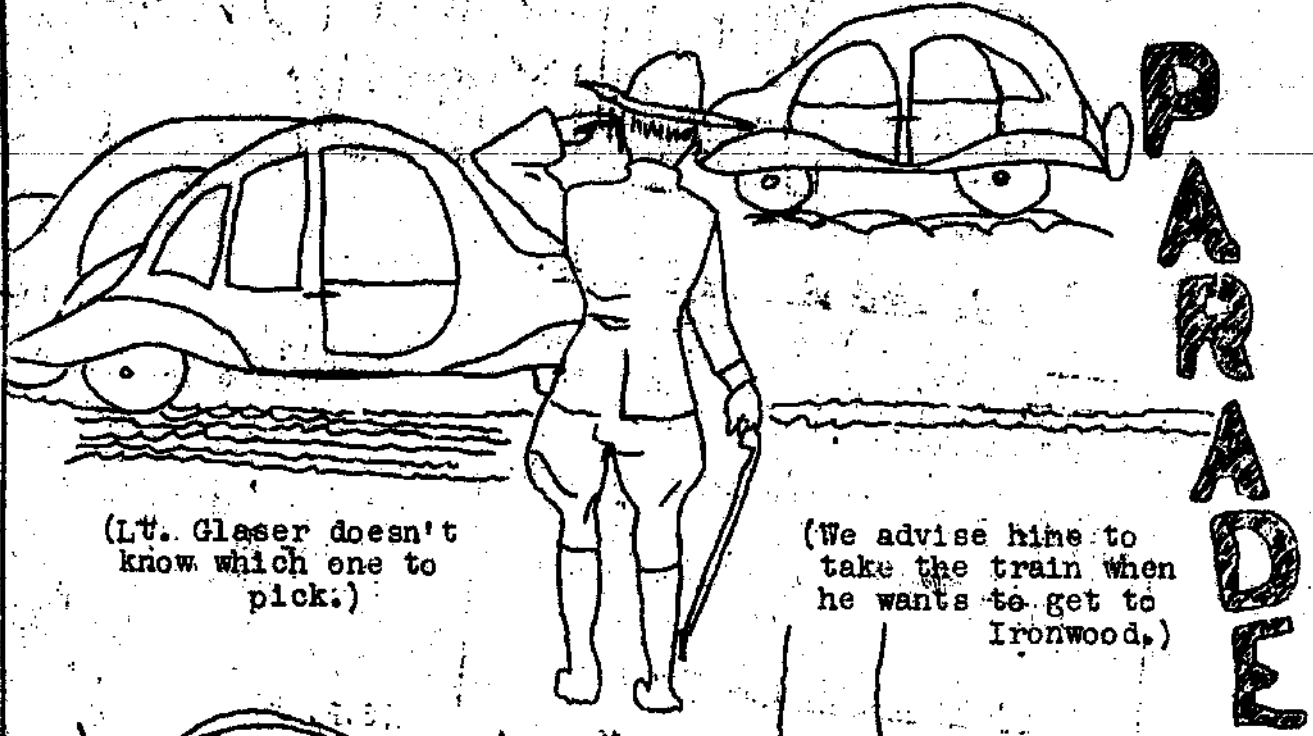
