

THE RASPBERRY BRANCH

On the 2nd of November ISII Francois Franche-Laframboise was christened at St. Benoit, Deux Montagnes, Quebec, Canada. The son of Joseph Franche-Laframboise and Catherine Lamagdeleine. Little is known of Francois' early childhood. There are notations of his father's dealings with Northwest Fur Company in Manitoba and Hudsons Bay Co.In Quebec.

From the parish registers of St. Benoit we find several

brothers and sisters.

The census records of I840 theu I870 indicate that a large number of the family kept residence in the parishes of St.Benoit, Scholastique, St. Pustache, and Deux Montagnes.

Francois arrived in Oregon Territory the 28th August 1830. He was a young man of nineteen years. An uncle preceded him in I8II on the Phip Tonquin, Michel, a noted employe of Hudsons Bay Company.

Francois married at St. James Parish Vancouver, Washington Territory the 26th June 1846. His bride was Mary Marguerite Tomwata, a Chinook Indian. Her parents were Paghakaliash and Sheipa of the Chinook Nation. Born to them were two children

Joseph chr I4 Dec 1848 Marguerite chr I8 Nov 1849

Francois and Marguerite applied for a Donation Land Claim of 503.93 acres on Public Domain land. Settlement was made on the Ist day of November I849. The claim certificate, number II4, was granted them on the I2 March I863. Marguerite was to enjoy this land only a short time before her death at Fort Vancouver the I5th November I850. Burial on I6 Nov I850.


Francois Laframboise declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States on the I2th day of September I850 before G.S. Curry, clerk of the U.S. District Court, Clackamus County, Oregon, and applied for citizenship April 3rd I855 in the District Court of Clark County, Wn. Territory, and was Naturalized by that court on that date as a citizen of the United States.

He served IOI days during the Yakima Indian War from the 6th April to I6th July 1856, in Captain William Kelly's Clark County Rangers, second Regiment Washington Volunteers as a Private.



A year after Marguerite died Francois married Denise Marie Dorion. Their marriage is recorded at St.James Parish, Vancouver on 27th November 1851. Her parents were Jean-Baptiste Dorion of French-Souix ancestry, and Josette Cayuse of the Cayuse Nation. The Dorions are decendants of Pierre Dorion, Sr. of Montreal, Canada who served as guide for the Lewis and Clark Expedition. Her Grandmother was Madame Marie Dorion of the Souix Nation, who with her husband Pierre Dorion, accompanied the Hunt Expedition to the Columbia.

The 26 of June of the year 1846, we undersigned priest missionary of the Company of Jesus, in view of the dispensation of 3 bans granted by us, nor any impediment to marriage being discovered, between François Laframboise son of Joseph Laframboise and of Catherine de la Madeleine, born at the River of the Swan, aged 32 years, on one part, and of Marie Marguerite daughter of Poghakelesh and of Shiepa, of the Tomwata nation (Cascades of the Columbia), aged about 20 years on the other part, have received their mutual consent and have given them the nuptial benediction in presence of Charles Prou and of Marie Anne Wagenuer, who have signed as witnesses with us.



Francois and Denise raised a large family. The first child Jeremie was born 7 Feb 1855 at Vancouver, Wn Territory. The I860 U.S. census of Clarke Co, Wn. Terr. Lists Frances Laframboise age 49, farmer, born Canada. Dana (Denise) wife age 29, Indian-mixed born Wash. Territory; Joseph age II (by his first wife) b. Wn., Isabelle age 3, Esther age I,b. Wn. Territory.

Denise is recorded as "Dana" on the I860 census, Denise in 1870. No death record can be found for the parents. "There is an old cemetery on the Art Koski land near Dahlia, Wn. many stones have sunk into the ground. We had thought, perhaps this might be their burial place as Joseph, the son of Francois' first wife, is buried in this spot." Mildred Colbert of Portland offers this oit of interesting information. Another suggestion by Francois' grand-daughter, Della(Souvigny)Quigley age 96, that family tradition has him buried in the Old Pioneer Cemetery, Cathlamet, County seat of Wahkiakum. With the restoration of this old cemetery, few headstones had been preserved due to the ravages of time and weather.


Francois' Donation Land Claim skirted Vancouver Lake. "He was raising timothy hay for market a few miles below Vancouver. " This no doubt would be from his land claim. He and his wife Denise were listed among the settlers at Chinookville in I85I; he was still living there, at least temporarily, in 1866. He seemed to move back and forth between his land claim in Vancouver and Chinookville.

"In the meantime Amable Petit hunted for a house to He found a one-story shake house 20x20 which belonged to Laframooise, which he bought for five dollars; as the Petit family moved in, Laframboise moved out into another little house."

In the I880 census Francois is listed as age 68, a labourer at Brookfield cannery. Again in the county census of I885 F. Laflamboy age 73 was living with Albert and Esther Roeder, but he was not on the 1887 census. He evidently died between October 1885 and June 1887.

Little Rose Frances Laframboise was sent to the Houseof-Providence in Vancouver. Records state: "Rosa Laframboise 1 Indian, homeless." Evidently her father could not care for her, and it appears Denise had passed on.



"Marie Dorion"

Marie, or Madame Dorion as she was known, accompanied the Hunt Expedition to the Columbia. Like Sacajawea who was guide to the Lewis and Clark trek West, Marie, a full blood Sioux, was the only woman to travel with Hunt's Expedition. Her husband Pierre Dorion had been an interpreter for the Missouri Fur Company. In 1810 Wilson Price Hunt was organizing the Astor Overland Expedition to go from the Mississippi to the Columbia. The Dorions were in St.Louis at this time and Hunt engaged Pierre to act as interpreter, he refused to go without his wife and two small sons, ages two and four years.

When not traveling by boat the two children were furna horse to ride while their mother trudged along on foot. Uncomplainingly she traveled over rugged mountains and kept pace with the men who walked. When the travelers were on the verge of starvation and without water for many days there was no complaint from Madame Dorion. Her uncomplaining attitude won for her the admiration of the

other members of the Party.

On December 30, I8II after jouneying many days in snow, she gave birth to a third child. This was on the Powder River. The next five days the Party of men rested in the Grande Ronde Valley, while the Dorions remained behind. They re-joined the company with Marie riding an old horse, a mere skeleton, carrying the new-born baby wrapped in a blanket, with the two year old child strapped to the side of the horse. Altho mostly Sioux this was the first child of white blood born on the Oregon Trail. On January 7, I8I2 this tiny baby died.

Marie continued on the grieving over the loss of her baby son. They endured unbelievable trials and hardships over the next few months. In November Reed prepared to go into winter quarters. While the men trapped Mrs.Dorion remained at the cabin to cook and dress the hides. The cabin was on the lower Boise River, near the present town of Caldwell, Ida.

Pierre, along with several other men were ambushed and killed by Indians. This massacre occurred about the middle of January (1813). Marie finding herself alone with two helpless children in a hostile Indian country, hundreds of miles from friends and the nearest white settlement, took flight. In a lonely, deep ravine by a spring of water, she secreted herself and children. With a buffalo robe and three deer skins she built a wigwam over pine coughs. Being entirely without food she killed and smoked the horse meat to sustains her little family. She used the hides to help cover the Wickiup, and there they remained for the winter.

By the middle od March her supply of food was nearly exausted, so with the supplies on her back she set out to cross the Blue Mountains. While traveling through the snow she became snow-blind and was almost as helpless as her children Crossing the mountains she came to the Wallah Wallah River, and following its banks, she came to the Columbia, where she met and was hospitably taken in by Walla Walla Indians.

As Irving and party were making their way up the River, to return to the States, several Indian canoes put out from shore, a voice in French called out to them; "Arrête", please stop. To their surprise they recognized the wife of Pierre Dorion, accompanied by her two children.

Mrs. Dorions account of the massacre on the Boise River and of her horrible experience following the tragedy was so vivid and tragic that three of the trappers were able to make entries in their journals to preserve a record of what occurred.

Later Marie Dorion made her way to the Willamette Valley where she re-married. Dr. Elijah White seeing her in later years stated he was impressed ith her noble and commanding bearing. For a more complete account, see Hist. Oregon, Santa Fe, and Other Trails.

"Marie"

This noble woman died the 6th September at St. Louis Parish, Territory of Oregon. Several monuments to her memory were erected. One near Caldwell, Idaho, another at Ontario, Oregon, and the South Dakota Historical Society erected one at Greenwood, S.D.



Her son, Jean-Baptiste Dorion, married Josette Cayuse. It was of this marriage that Denise Marie was born, who in turn married Francois LaFramboise.

It was this same Jean-Baptiste with his brother Paul, who as mere infants crossed this great country, over plains, rivers, and mountains, to reach the Columbia River.

JOSEPH LAFRAMBOISE

Joseph was born 18 November 1845 Vancouver, Washington Territory. The son of Francois and Mary Marguerite Tumwata. He married 25 March 1878 at Astoria, Oregon to Sophie Durival (Duval). She was born 15 October 1860 near Oysterville, Wash. Her christening date 16 Oct. 1860 at Stellamaris Mission, Point Chinook, Wn. Her parents were Pierre (Peter) Durival and Amelia Ec-cle-sic. Joseph died after 1894, drowned in the Columbia River. He had a large family all born in Dahlia, Wahkiakum County.

MICHEL LAFRAMBOISE

I had wondered what the connection was to these two men, Francois and Michel. In my search in Feb. 1981 of the micro-films of Quebec Parish Registers, I did find the birth of Michel. Born 6 May 1786 at Verennes, Vercheres, Quebec, the son of Michel Laframpoise and Marie Josephte DeVoyon. The common grandfather of the Laframboise men of Washington and Oregon Territory is Adrian Laframboise, a planter from Kittery, Maine.

Michel came to Oregon Territory on the Ship Tonquin which left the Port of New York Sept...I810 for the hazerdous journey around The Horn to Astoria. He is listed as a boatman. He later was employed by the Hudsons Bay Company and became an interpreter and guide for various fur ventures. He had many Indian wives. His last and most constant wife who seemed to settle him down to domestic living was Emilie Picard. Nineteen years later a nephew, Francois Laframboise from St.Benoit, Deux Montagnes joined his name to the Historical Annals of this new country.




Michel Laframboise and his wife Emélie Picard and son Abraham



The ceiling fixtures are for holding candles, and were lowered for placing and lighting. Only candlelight was allowed during the Shaker services.

Candles, the three crosses, the white covered table, and bells of varying sizes were all necessary to the Shaker services.

Persons identified included (standing) "China John," Joe Waine and his son, Charles Waine, John Skanown and John Benn. Those seated include Mrs. Charles Wilson, the former Mrs. John Pickernell, Jr., whose maiden name was Margaret Ero; Mrs. John Hawks (Annie) and her son Lewis and daughters Elsie and Lottie Hawks Waine, with Baby Clara; Mrs. Lucy Andrews-Benn, and Mrs. Jorgen Wells.


OLD INDIAN SHAKER CHURCH

Built on the hill, the present site of the town of Bay Center, Washington After the new INDIAN SHAKER CHURCH was built, this building was used as a dance hall, and as a gymnasium where prize fights (boxing) and wrestling matches were held.

THE STORY OF ROSE

Grandmother Rose Laframboise was born 25 Nov I869-died 2 Aug I952 Beaverton, Oregon. Rose was just a child I3 years of age and had not yet reached maturity when she married a handsome French-Canadien Xavier Souvigny. This marriage is recorded at Cathlamet, Wn the 28th Dec I882. He had been engaged in mining in Nevada, and driving his Ox team for a lumber firm established in Wahkiakum County following his migration to the United States, which he did after age 2I years, traveling "Round the Horn".

Xavier was christened Francois Xavier Sevigny I3 Oct 1850 at St. Esprit, Montcalm, Quebec. A son of Joseph Sevigny and Phelonise Vesinat. After marriage to Rose he settled her in a lovely home in the Elochoman Valley on what has always been referred to as the "Souvigny Ranch". Xavier began farming in ernest to care for his growing family.





7 children were born here, the eighth child, Eleanor, was born at Pendleton, Oregon. Rose Laframboise lost her mother at a tender age. Our first observation of her was on the I870 U.S. census of Wahkiakum Co, Wn. age 7 months with her parents, Francois and Denise, and five other children, Rose being the youngest.

The next official entry was in Vancouver, Wn. "We found the name Rose Laframboise as having entered Providence Academy from Cathlamet on November 9,1875 at age five. She left the school on October Ist,1880, but no indication as to where she went. There is a note to the effect that she made her first Holy Communion."

She returned to Wahkiakum County. Rose stated that her father placed her in the care of a French couple, she saw money change hands, and always felt she had been taken advantage of by these people, who we understand went back to France. It is believed to be the Pacific Cadeau family. It was about two years later that she was married to Xavier Souvigny, at age thirteen years.

A sorrowful event in the Souvigny family life was the marital rift between Rose and Xavier. Grandpa began to drink. He would go into town leaving his young wife and children on the Ranch. It was a wild and lonely place in those days, their nearest neighbors were nearly a mile away. Rose must have had all she could manage because she packed up three of the girls and left for Pendleton, Oregon where she applied for help with the Indian Bureau at Grande Ronde for food allotment. She was expecting her eighth child at this time, Eleanor was born IO June 1896.

Rose cooked on farms around Pendleton so she could have the girls with her. She also worked in a laundry for a time. Rose met and married Henry Arbogast at Walla Walla, Wn. in I898 .Henry had a candy store on Pendleton's main street.

Shortly after her marriage she sent Della, Annie, and Neva back to their father in Wahkiakum County, where Xavier reared these 7 children on the Souvigny Ranch.

Rose spent many years as a practical nurse, caring for her patients in their homes, and sometimes in her own home. She delivered many babies during this period of her life. She had worked hard and long to carve out a life for herself and her child.

Later they moved to Portland where they owned a grocery store on 60th and Halsey street. They later sold this and purchased a store on Prescott Street. Rose loved to sew. She made clothes for herself and for some of her friends. She helped Henry in the store, and baked and sold cakes. Burnt sugar cakes were her specialty. She was a quiet reserved little person, with a ready smile. Her daughter Eleanor graciously filled in some of the personal aspects of her life.

Little Rose Laframboise died at Beaverton, Oregon on the 2nd of August 1952, age 80 years, 8 Months and 7 days. She was laid to rest in the Greewood Hills Cemetery, Portland.

DELLA SOUVIGNY HISTORY 1961 By her daughter Bethina Foster

Mom is getting quite shaky when it comes to writing but very alert otherwise. She still maintains her own home and yard. If it were not for arthritis and sinus trouble she would be in the best of health. You would never suspicion that she would be seventy-six this fall. I'm afraid none of us will ever achieve all the accomplishments in life that she has. She is always ready to go whenever a car stops for her. With three grandsons on the starting line on the basket-ball team she was really busy this winter. I would venture to say she never missed more than two or three games the whole season. She claims her children and her grand-children are all she has to live for. Being a great-grandmother gives her even more to boast about. She loves pretty jewelry, clothes, and takes great pride in her looks. The grey hair still has many strands of black showing thru. In fact if any of us would give the go-ahead she would have a dye job. The Catholic Church and Grange are both a part of her way of life. When rearing her brood of eleven, she had very little time for social functions.

Della Mae Souvigny was born November 5th 1885, on the old homestead in the lower Flochoman Valley. She was the second child born to hose and Xavier. The delivery was performed by Margaret Foster, a midwife. (my husband's grandmother) She recalls her early childhood, not too vividly. Her first school at the age of seven was in a one-room school house located on the Pacific Cadeau homestead, about a mile from They walked thru mud, timber, and cattle to attend four or five hours a day, three days a week. When in the third grade her parents separated. Her mother took Annie, Neva and herself with her to Pendleton, Oregon to live. The mother, Rose, was pregnant at the time. The three girls were enrolled in the St.Andrews Sister School. After Eleanor was born the mother went to work and it was up to Della to care for the baby and attend school when she could. Mom recalls taking the baby to school with her many times. after a few months Rose met Henry Arbogast whom she married. Soon after the marriage the three older girls were sent back to their father in Cathlamet. Mom said the Sisters at the school put them on a train and grandpa met them in Fortland and they returned to the Ranch by the steamer "Lurline". About a year later grandpa decided to send them to Chamawa. (the school for children of varying degrees of Indian blood) Tillie Marie, Frank, and Joseph, who had stayed with their father were already attending school there. After a year Mom decided to return home and keep house for the family. She stayed on the ranch and kept house until she was fourteen and then went to Portland to work for the Andrew Cook family who lived on Grant street. She continued to work for about two years and returned once more to the ranch. She recalls working for the Pacific Cadeau family and then for the John Doumits.

She worked for this family up until the time of her marriage at age 2^L, to Leonard Quigley on February 28, I909. They were married at the family home by Jesse Graham, Justice of The Peace. The Newly weds journeyed to Portland for a two week honeymoon. On their return they lived with Dad's folks for a short time and then moved into a house on the Charlie Foster place. On November 28, I909 their first child Bethina was oorn.

Before the birth of this twelve pound baby Moms weight was over two hundred pounds. The same midwife was around but refused to help in this case and urged Mom to go to a nursing home in Portland. This she did and a wiser decision no midwife could have ever made because of the difficult birth. Dr.Rand cast the baby aside to concentrate on the life of the mother. Dad, discouvering that there was life in the baby asked the nurse to clean me up and try to save me. They pulled us both through!

January 6, 19 II Leonard, Jr. was born. No other name could have been more fitting as he was born on Dad's birthday.

The same dear old Grandma Foster delivered him.

March 24th, 1913 along came Marie with Dr. Clark performing the honors. Later this same year we moved to Clifton, Oregon a little Greek settlement across the river from Cathlamet. Dad was the new Boom Foreman.

July 18th, 1915 Lakene was born. Dr.Clark was the physician. Dad had to go in his boat to Cathlamet and bring him over to deliver the baby. (I remember this well, for I was crying with a toothache and after he delivered the baby he pulled my tooth) Dad decided it was time for me to go to a school and it should nt be a Greek school, so we moved back to Cathlamet. Once again we lived just a few hudred yards from the house we had previously had lived in.

September 25, 1918 Leona was delivered by Dr. Pierctt along with the help of Aunt Marie Souvigny. About this time Dad decided he would have to have some extra income to care for the increasing brood so once agin we moved, this time to one of the Birnie houses facing the Columbia River. Dad began to fish nights in hopes to buy food for the family. He

worked days on the traps for Joe Burk.

December I3, I920 Dr. Pierott again delivered another baby, Frank. Just about time to move agin as this house was getting too small so we moved to Athens addition on the flats as they were called. It was in this green shingled house by Birnie Creek that Lawrence was born December I6, I92I. The same old Doctor (Pierott)

Long enough to live in one place so here we go again. This time we moved into a house owned by the Bradley logging Company and it was just a few yards from the second house we lived in by the tracks.

January I2, I923 Berl, December 24, I924 Patricia Ann, Nov.I I925 Delores, were born (same old Doctor) February II, I929 the last baby, Kenneth, was born. Dr. Fritz a new physician in the community delivered him.

In 1952 Mom and Dad decided now that all the kids were gone they should have a smaller house so they purchased a home on the main highway about two miles from Cathlamet. This was the first home they really owned.

On December 2I,1957 Dad passed away. We buried him on December 24th. Xmas Eve has always been a sad time for us since. The adjustment was a real challenge for Mom, but with her family all so close by she was the type of person who overcame all obstacles. When she looks back now and thinks of the old flat irons, wash board and oil lamps she marvels how they were ever able to rear eleven children. Accidents were plentiful. Marie had her eye amputated when she was five, Leona was severely burned at five, these were the major ones. (Bethina was elected County Clerk in 1955 and remained in that position until her death 31 Dec 1977)

DAD HAD LITTLE OR NO EDUCATION. MOTHER WENT TO THE CHAMOA SCHOOL WITH MATILDA. AS FAR AS I KNOW MOTHER ONLY FINISHED EXCHT GRADE. MOTHER AND FATHER WERE THE MOST KIND AND GEREOUS PEOPLE EVER. THEY VERY SELDOM PUNISHED US AND I KNOW NOW THAT WE NEEDED IT A LOT OF TIMES DAD WOULD ALWAYS BRING US A GIFT FROM ASTORIA EACH SUMMER WHEN HE CAME HOME FROM FISHING. I REMEMBER ONE OF MINE SO WELL. HE MENT IT REALLY ONLY AS A JOKE-IT WAS A LITTLE BLACK HULLA HULA DOLL ON A STRING- WHEN YOU BOUNDED IT UP AND DOWN THE GRASS SKIRT WOULD FLY AROUND.

MOM WAS SO PROUD OF JUNIOR AND BOGGIE IN FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL. SHE WENT TO ALL THE GAMES.

I CAN ERMEMBER ONCE WHEN THE COLUMBIA RIVER FROZE OVER. DAD TOOK US SLED RIDING ON THE ICE. IT WAS AN EXCITTING EXPERIENCE.

MOTHER WAS MUCH YOUNGER THAN DAD. SHE WAS THIRTEEN WHEN MARRIED AND DAD WAS 33/18 YEARS APART BUT THEY DIED ONLY 6 MONTHS APART. MOTHER HAD BEEN ILL WITH HEART AND GALL STONES FOR YEARS.

WHEN THE HIGHWAY WAS CONSTRUCTED IT RAN RIGHT THROUGH OUR HOME, THAT MOM AND DAD HAD LIVED IN FOR ALMOST 40 YEARS. IT HURT MOTHER SO MUCH TO HAVE TO MOVE THAT SHE BECAME ILL AND GREW STEADLY WORSE UNTIL HER DEATH. THE OLD HOUSE HAD MANY MEMORIES. INEZ AND JUNIOR MERE BORN THERE. WE HAD CHERRY TREES, PEAR AND PLUM TREEES. AND FINE GRAVENSTEIN APPLES. BLACK AND ROYAL ANN CHERRIES.

DAD MADE FINE NETS. IT IS DIFFICUT TO CAPTURE ON PAPER THE METHOD HE USED. I KNOW THE LENNEN THREAD CAME LIKE YARN AND WE PUT IT ON HOME MADE SPINDLES THAT SPUN AS HE MADE IT INOT A BALL. WITH THE BALL OF WEB WE USED THE FISH NET NEEDLE THAT WE FILLED. DAD MADE DIFFERENT SIZE MASH FOR THE VARIOUS NETS SUCH AS DIVER AND FLOATER. HE HAD A BOARD HE HELD IN HISLEFT HAND AND KNIT WITH HIS RIGHT UNTIL THE BOARD WAS FULL. THEN HE DROPPED IT OFF AND FILLED AGAIN.


CHEMAWA INDIAN SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

ADRAIN FRYES NAME FIRST APPEARS ON THE KITTERY, MAINE RECORDS IN 1664. HE WAS A QUAKER LAD WHO MARRIED SARAH, DAUGHTER OF JOHN WHITE. HIS MARK (X) IS FOUND ON MANY LEGAL PAPERS. HE WITNESSED A DEED IN 1663 AND HAD A GRANT OF 100 ACRES IN 1669. ADRIAN LIVED JUST SOUTH OF STURGEON CREEK IN 1674. THIS AREA WAS KNOWN AS FRYES POINT.

That from henceforth there shall not be any rum or other strong liquor or flip be sold vnto any Inhabytant of the town by any ordinary keeper therein Directly or Indirectly, Except in Case of great nesessity as in Case of sickness &c: nor shall any ordinary keeper sell vnto any stranger more then one gill for a person at one time, and all Ciuell officers, Especially select men and constables in the respective townes in this province are required to take Especiall Care by Inspecting any suspitious house or houses where any such abuses or profanenesse may be acted, and in Case any ordinary keeper shall presume to transgress this order he shall Imediately forfeit his licence

CARRIED TO CANADA

JOSEPH FRY, SON OF ADRIAN AND SARAH WAS TAKEN CAPTIVE ABOUT 1695,
CARRIED INTO CANADA. IN THE NEW ENGLAND RECORDS OF THOSE TAKEN BY
INDIANS IS THE FOLLOWING ENTRY. "JOSEPH FRY OF KITTERY TAKEN ABOUT 1695,
AGGED ABOUT 15 OR 16 YERES "JOSEPH WAS ON THE SOUTH SHORE OF STURGEON
CREEK WHEN HE WAS CAPTURED. THE SAVAGES TREATED HIM BADLY, CUTTING STRIPS
OF FLESH FROM HIS BODY. A SQUAW OFFERED HIS CAPTORS A SHEEP IN EXCHANGE
FOR THE BOY. THEY GAVE JOSEPH TO HER. SHE FED HIM ON RED RASPBERRIES AND
HE EVENTUALLY RECOVERED. RED RASPBERRY IN FRENCH IS LAFRAMBOISE.

JOSEPH WAS ON THE LIST OF PRISONERS OF 1710-11, AND IN THAT YEAR HE
ASKED TO BE MADE A CITIZEN OF NEW FRANCE. HE TOOK A FRENCH NAME OF ANDRE
FRENCHE dit LAFRAMBOISE. OUR QUAKER GRANDFATHER IS NOW ANDRE, A CATHOLIC
OF CANADA.

THE MARRIAGE CONTRACT OF ANDRE AND MARIE LOUISE BIGRAS WAS SIGNED ON THE 12 OCT. 1713 AT THE HOME OF JACQUES LA CALLE, MASTER CARPENTER. ANDRE WAS ABOUT 33 YEARS OF AGE AND HIS BRIDE 19 YEARS. HIS NEW BRIDE RECEIVES THE CUSTOMARY PORTION OF FIVE HUNDRED LIVERS TO BE PAID AT HER OPTION. NEITHER CAN BE HELD FOR EACH OTHERS DEBTS. ANDRE TOOK HIS FIRST GRANT OF LAND AT GRANDE ANSE WHICH IS BETWEEN POINTE-CLAIRE AND LA CHINETHIS WAS GIVEN HIM IN 1716.

THE MARRIAGE OF ANDRE AND MARIE TOOK PLACE IN THE PARISH OF ST JOACHIM ON 16 OCT 1713. THE BABTISMS OF 12 CHILDREN ARE RECORDED.

ANDRE, UNDER CANADIAN FEUDALISM, BECAME A TENANT OF THE GENTLEMEN OF THE SEMINARY, THE SEIGNEURS OF THE ISLAND OF MONTREAL.

IN 1748 ANDRE FRANCHE dit LAFRAMBOISE WAS ONE OF FIVE BOATMEN ENGAGED BY THE SIEUR SAUVAGE, WHO WAS ALLOWED TO TRADE WITH THE INDIANS AT THE POST OF MICHIPICOTON. ANDRE HAD DIED BY 1757, WHEN HIS SON JACQUES MARRIED.





TRAGEDY OF THE LOST RACE

DIONNE LAFROMBOICE sits on a pile of old lumber in Zortman, Montana. He is waiting and has been waiting for over 50 years, and before him, his father and mother waited and also his grandparents. For more than 100 years they have been waiting for what they believe is justly theirs.

In their home in Zortman, Joseph Dussome and his wife also sit and wait, and like Lafromboice, their fathers and mothers and grandparents, too, sat and waited. And the grim tragedy is that they will wait until death and their children wi wait and there will be no redress for the great wrong done them.

Dussome and his wife and Lafromboice belong to tha strange race called "The Metis".

The history of this unfortunate group of people goes bactothe early days in America. These people were the result of early intermarriages between French men and Indian women, mainly Crees and Chippewas. The children of these couple in turn married whites, Indians or other crossbreeds. By the middle of the 19th century, these descendants were beginning to form a separate ethnic group, neither Indian nor white, rarely accepted by either, and without the benefits that wend to either group.

They were and are known by several names. The American frontiersmen called them half-breeds. The French called them Metis, meaning crossbreeds, or bois-brule, which means burnt wood. This term came from the translation of a Chippew term Wisahkotewan Niniwak, which means men partly burnt It referred to the color of their skins, which was darker than that of the whites and lighter than that of the pure Indians.

The term Metis seemed best and it stuck, since it took in a large group, not only people who were half-and-half, or the products of an Indian mother and a French father, but the end results of these mixtures after further mixing with other whites or Indians. They were heading toward what one his torian called "the emergence of a new race, indigenous to this continent."

These people, naturally, took various characteristics and

customs from the different groups who contributed to their formation. Like the Indians, they depended largely on the buffalo for subsistence. But their buffalo hunts were organized differently than those of the Indians. The Metis made a practice of going to the Red River area every fall for their buffalo hunts, and then returning to their own settlements.

The Indians used mainly horses for transportation, the Metis also used a homemade wagon known as the Half-Breed Cart. As metal was scarce, this was made entirely of wood, not only body and wheels but even the axles. The wheels were huge, often being taller than a man, while a small carriage body rested on the axle, between the wheels, and the shaft. The noises made by these carts, the ungreased wooden wheels creaking on the ungreased wooden axle, groaning under a load of 600-800 pounds, can well be imagined.

Normally, these were pulled by a single pony. In the winters, the body of the cart could be lifted off and used as a sleigh. Later, as metals became more readily available, the wide wheels were equipped with metal tires and the wooden axles were supplanted by metal ones. With a little grease on the axles the distinctive noise fortunately disappeared. Made in this fashion, they became the famous Red River Carts.

The Metis, when living in settlements, built houses showing their French heritage, usually one-story buildings, gaudily painted. While on the trail, they used tents. Their hunts frequently took them long distances, too long to return to their habitat often. But they built settlements, a sort of permanent camp, composed of frontier cabins. Like the Indians did with their traces, the Metis built their cabins in a circle around a

central building. These houses always had a fireplace at one end, and the floors were left bare. The central building was actually a large hall, with a puncheon floor, and was used primarily for dancing.

The Metis liked to dance, and here again French influence showed. Whereas the Indians also liked to dance, their dance was an extension of their religion, often an expression of it, but the Metis just danced for fun. The Indian dances lively at times, were generally rather serious, formalized affairs, with the chief musical feature being the drums hammering out the beat. The Metis dances were done to the music of the fiddle, sometimes a real one handed down, but more often a homemade one, using a hollow piece of wood and catgut. The tunes were usually adaptations of old French folk songs. The dances, gay and lively, in time became known as Red River Jigs.

The Metis's French heritage showed in their Catholic religion, and also in their language, which was a mixture of their several heritages: French, Cree, Chippewa and some English. As a result of this mixture, the later Metis could understand each other, but had great difficulty with pure French, Chippewa or Cree.

Their main settlements were along the Red River, and around Pembina, North Dakota. Being part-Indian, they would often go long distances to hunt; being part-white, they would often stay at semi-permanent sites for several years. They were not true nomads. The trouble, in fact was that they were not true anything. They were a mixture. They were Metis.


WE OWE A DEBT OF GRATITUDE TO THE MANY CATHOLIC PRIESTS WHO BRAVED THE WILDERNESS AND FOR THEIR ACCURATE RECORD KEEPING OF BIRTHS, MARRIAGES AND DEATHS, WITHOUT WHICH WE WOULD NOT HAVE HAD THIS GENEOLOGY.

WE HAVE THE AMAZING VERIFIED HISTORY OF ADRIANS SON, JOSEPH, BEING TAKEN CAPTIVE AND CARRIED TO CANADA-HIS BECOMMING A CITIZEN OF THAT COUNTRY-CHANGING HIS NAME TO ANDRE FRANCHE LAFRAMBOISE-AND HIS BECOMMING A CATHOLIC- THIS ONCE QUAKER LAD OF KITTERY, YORK, MAINE. OUR GREAT GRANDFATHER FRANCOIS RESTLESS SPIRIT BROUGHT HIM TO A NEW FRONTIER IN WASHINGTON TERRITORY-HIS LOVE FOR THE LAND AND ITS NATIVE PEOPLE- HIS MARRIAGE FIRST TO MARGURITE TUMWATA A CHINOOK WOMAN, AND THEN TO DENISE DORION, A CAYUSE INDIAN WOMAN.

GEOGRAPHLY, OUR CHILDREN SHOULD ACQUAINT THEMSELVES WITH OUR FAMILIES LOCATIONS, FORT VANCOUVER, CHINOOKVILLE, SHOALWATER BAY, CATHLAMET, DEUX MONTAGNES, QUEBEC, POINT CLAIR, AND LASTLY, KITTERY MAINE.

MY MOTHER AND I CAN LEAVE LITTLE ELSE OF GREAT WORTH TO OUR FAMILIES, SAVE IT BE THIS WRITTEN RECORD OF OUR HERITAGE. WE HOPE THAT FROM THIS TIME FORTH ALL OUR FAMILY WILL TAKE A KEEN INTEREST IN THE KEEPING OF FAMILY GENEOLOGY AND HISTORIES. THE COMMON EVERY DAY EVENTS IN OUR LIVES WILL SOME DAY BE AS INTERESTING TO OUR GREAT GRANDCHILDREN AS WE FIND INTEREST IN THE STORY OF THE LAFRAMBOISE FAMILY. WE SHOULD WRITE ABOUT OUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS, OUR SORROWS, JOYS, JOBS, RELIGIOUS BACKGROUND
