PATRICK GEELAN

1833

Pat was born August 15, 1833 in Cork Ireland. (In a letter dated 9 July 1909, Sister Valere says, "How is dear old Papa's health? "Good, good" is the reply, I know. I shall pen him many love messages for August 15."

It is not known whether he was born in the city, Cork, or merely in the County of that name. Since it is said that his father had a farm of 40 acres, it would seem that he was born "somewhere in the county"

Father Delorme of St. Paul Parish recorded on Pat's wedding day, June 19, 1873, that Pat's father, James Geelan was deceased; but that his mother Jane (Mary Jane) O'Connor Geelan was alive in Ireland. (Mary Jane Geelan Beyer was undoubtedly named for her.

Mary Jane O'Connor is said to have lived to the age of 92. Both of Pat's parents lived out their lives in Ireland. Probably most of their children came to the United States.

Family notes include these names as Pat's brothers and sisters:

Bea married to Owen McHugh, resided in San Francisco around the turn of the century until at least 1899.

Ann married to an O'Donnell

Elizabeth married McDowell resided 295 Montgomery St. Portland OR She might have been only a cousin.

Jim resided Springville, Multnomah Co. OR in June 1872 according to Patrick McIntee will drawn on that date. He is said to have worked with Pat in Portland, making and laying bricks. He is possibly the brother killed by a winch designed by Pat to lift bricks at building sites. The winch was modeled on a ship's capstan.

Edward died in San Francisco

Michael settled in Chicago, possibly married a Cudahay

These names from the family notes probably don't form a complete list of the Geelan family.

The book, The Famine Immigrants Arriving at the Port of New York, Volume I and II Jan 1846 to June 1847 by Glazier, lists the following Geelans: Elizabeth aged 19, a seamstress, Mary aged 16 years, a servant, Patrick aged 22 and Francis aged 20 laborers, Sam aged 40 also a laborer. Whether these Irish passengers are related to us is unknown.

The Ireland of 1833 into which Patrick Geelan was born, had long been under the boot heel of its English neighbor. The Catholics of the country, had for a century lived under the

constraint of the Penal Laws. Though these laws were relaxed by 1833, Catholics were only elevated from peonage to a second class citizenship. The Irish peasantry continued on a tightrope of survival.

Under a law designed to keep them from gaining too much land, farms and family debts had to be divided among all the sons. With the large Irish families, the land was divided and re-divided by marriage until the average farm size fell to less than fifteen acres.

If Pat's father, James did indeed have a forty acre farm, it would have been a sizeable holding by peasant standards of the time.

The potato became the staple of the poor Irish's existence. It was easy to plant and required little attention. An average size family could get by on a few acres of them. Dependence on the potato set the stage for disaster.

1845

From 1845 until 1850, a blight struck the Irish potato crop. Because of British ineptness and callousness, a great famine raged out of control.

An estimated million peasants died of hunger and disease (during a time when the English exported beef from the country). A million others fled the country.

The family notes say Pat left Ireland when he was twelve (1845) and that he lived in Liverpool until he was nineteen (1852)

His departure from Ireland coincided with the first year of the famine, possibly indicated that the Geelan's were hit very early.

1854

The notes next say that he arrived in New York for the first time, when he was twenty three (1856)

It is interesting that we have a documents from the period of Pat's life which seems to contradict the family notes. On 11 Oct 1856 Naturalization Papers were drawn for him in Porter County, Indiana (on Lake Michigan). The document certifies that he arrived at New York on 5th Nov 1854.

1855

The explanation for this confusion of dates seems to lay in the fact that during this time, Patrick is said to have been a merchant mariner. By 1855, the notes say, he was serving as first mate on a sailing vessal. (He was 22 in 1855.)

Gold had been discovered in California in 1848, resulting in a heavy demand for passenger service from the East Coast ports to the gold fields, as well as a demand for vessals to carry cargo in the newly important Pacific.

Although the British used steamships and iron vessals on the seas, in this country their use was limited mainly to inland waterways. (Champoeg's Robert Newell opened steamship service on the Willamette in 1851.)

The American answer to steamships on the high seas was the dashing class of ship called "The Clipper". Still operating in this era, were the older style, square rigged ships and barks with three masts and brigs with two masts, of 100 to 200 ton register.

Very few Americans sailed before the mast at this time because the wages paid by American shippers were so low and life at sea so hard that the American seaman, who had been a source of pride to America in the early years of the century, would no longer have any part of the sea.

Crews were generally tough derelicts, packet-rats, of shanghai'd foreigners who were made to work for the pitifully small salaries offered by the shippers. The conditions of the crews were a national disgrace. In addition to the squalid conditions aboard ship, shipwrecks were common. (This information from American Science and Invention by Wilson, Bonanza Books, New York.

1859

The family notes go on to say that in 1859, sailing under Captain Cross, Pat's ship encountered a fierce storm which swept the Captain overboard, leaving Pat in command. The ship was on a voyage rounding Cape Horn, bound for San Francisco. So, at the age of twenty six, we are told, he became a captain. ⁱⁿ He made three voyages around the Cape, before he quit the sea forever.

San Francisco Arrivals Vol. II, pg. 99 lists Captain Cross in command of a schooner called Energy. Feb. 3, 1851, she departed Boston and 366 days later arrived in San Francisco. Perhaps a search of maritime records of 1850 and after, would reveal Pat's story in more detail.

1861

April 12, 1861 confederate guns fired on Fort Sumpter, South Carolina, the opening action of the Civil War. That same year, President Lincoln called for a blockade of all Southern

ports. However, the U.S. Navy only totalled about ninety ships, and the Confederate coast line was 3,500 miles long.

By purchase, the navy aquaried 79 steamers and 58 sailing vessels of various classes in conjunction with construction of new tonnage.

During the Civil War there was to be a shrinkage of nearly a million tons in American shipping on the high seas. Four fifths of the shrinkage would be due to war losses and to the transfer of American vessels to foreign flags to escape the hazards of war.

1862

Possibly to avoid military service, or the added danger of sailing in war-time, Pat left his ship in 1862, coming ashore for good at the fabled Port of the Golden Gate - San Francisco.

San Francisco has a special place in the whole Geelan story:

1. Pat would later marry a woman whose father, Robert Ady was there in 1849. He had come overland from Ohio to Fort Hall in Idaho the same year as William Marshall. Marshall and others had gone south to California. A ship's captain putting into port for supplies for the gold fields carried the news of the strike to Oregon. Oregonians, Robert Ady among them, were some of the first 49ers.

Ady returned to Oregon and married the widow of another Oregon 49er, Phinneas R. Hunt.

2. Bea Geelan McHugh lived in the City (she was there in 1908, visited by Alice and Annie Geelan-her neices. A letter written by Pat's wife, Elizabeth Ady Geelan to her daughters is addressed to them at the McHugh residence at 704 Corner of Baker and McAlister Streets. It is unknown if the residence were new or had survived the earthquake of 8 April 1906.

"Gene" Geelan, Pat's youngest son, would work in San Francisco briefly as a very young man with Owen McHugh for a large oil company. He returned to Oregon to live out his life where he was born, as shown on his family group sheet in this booklet.

3. James Geelan Bastasch, a great-great grandson was born there 21 Aug 1961.
4. Col. Buck Buckles, a great grand-son died at the Presidio where he was stationed 22 Feb 1986. Buck's widow, now remarried and his children still reside in this city so special to the family.

6. "Joey" Hiller Thielen, although now living in Montana, lived in the Bay Area at one time.

Doubtless others of the family have touched base in San Francisco. I wish that I knew each story that I might include it here.

But, returning to our Patrick Geelan, newly off his ship.. the notes say he did what every able bodied man since 1848 had done, he went looking for gold.

In "Fort Hall, Place of Destiny" Minnie F. Howard, an acquaintance of Marie Sprogis Buckles, said, "From 1848 until 1861, \$900,000,000 of gold was taken out of California."

Pat's Irish luck was with him it is said, he realized \$1800 over a three week period in the mines. He seems to have set aside one nugget which he later had worked into a ring for his bride. This ring remains one of the family's most cherished heirlooms.

1864

California gold was Pat's stake to a life of farming in Oregon. My parish priest, Msgr. Michael Lenihan, himself from Cork, told me that in only a few of the American states did Irish immigrants have the opportunity to farm, although that had been their life's work in Ireland. One of those states was Oregon.

Two years after he left his ship, he purchased Oregon land with a partner, Patrick McIntee.

Why or how Pat got to Oregon will probably always remain a mystery. But arrive he did. The family notes say that he deposited his money at the Ladd and Tildon Bank in Portland. He and his brother are said to have operated a brick making and laying business in that city.

Although Pat and McIntee purchased land in 1864, they seem not to have lived on it full time during these years. In fact, we are told that the brick operation financed improvements to the farm land.

The notes mention two buildings worked on by the Geelans: 1) the post office building and 2) the St. Charles Hotel. Although we have no real record of the brick company, its true ownership or its duration, we do have an abstract of the Geelan farm land; and it is this land that is the centerpiece of Pat's story from 1864 to his death in 1916.

abstract states that Geelan bought out McIntee's interest.

A feature of the farm, Skookum Lake, originally covered 120 acres. Early in Pat's ownership, he reduced its size to 40 acres with the help of Chinese labor. They dug a new outlet ditch straight north to the Willamette River. In all, 1200 feet of new channel were opened, taking three summers to complete. There seems also to have been a continuing logging operation, possibly to open up new fields for cultivation.

1868

During the time that he was preparing his land and working the brick operation in Portland, he filed for citizenship. A copy of the document is included in this booklet. His name also appears on a San Francisco to Portland passenger list in 1868.

1873

Pat has been described as a short, powerfully built man, 5'-6" or 5'-7" tall. He was blond, fair, a jolly man and great talker with a booming voice. He is also described as progressive, diplomatic, authoritative and as having a dynamic personality.

In his later years, he would weigh 220 pounds and his chest would measure 46 inches.

He loved to fish and hunt.

In 1873, nearing 40, he was an eligible bachelor who chanced, we know not how, to meet a young widow, Elizabeth Ady Goodrich.

ELIZABETH ADY

1852

As Elizabeth Ady Geelan's tombstone proudly proclaims, she was born in Champoege, Oregon Territory (3 Sept. 1852).

In contrast to Patrick Geelan's wide immigratory path from Ireland, her life course was a narrower one, lived entirely within a small radius encompassing a few small towns on a bend of the Willamette River.

Besides this broad difference in life experience, the husband and wife were separated by a nineteen year age difference and varying religious backgrounds.

Both of Elizabeth's parents came of quintessential American pioneer families, restless and on the move westward from Colonial times. Both parents had made the tough overland journey via the Oregon Trail, though not together. Her mother, Mary Ann Mitchell Ady had crossed as the wife of Phinneas R. Hunt, probably in 1845. Her father, Robert Ady, had come to Oregon as a bachelor in 1844.

The widow Hunt (Phinneas died in San Francisco in 1848/9) and Ady married in Marion County 14 September 1849. The Ady household in 1852, the year Elizabeth was born, consisted of her parents, Henry C. and Virginia Prudence "Prudy" Hunt, and Lenora/Lenoir Ady.

The Ady Farm was situated on the edge of the old French Prairie settlement of Champoege, still a thriving little river town in 1852. Oregonians are mindful of the special place the town has in the history of the Pacific Northwest. It is honored as an ancient dwelling of Indians; as a trappers' rendezvous and depot; as a place where aging voyageurs and engagés of the Hudson's Bay Company chose to live out their retirement; as the site of the settler's meetings and votes which would culminate in the Oregon Provisional Government; and as such it's the subject of a wonderful book called Champoege: Place of Transition by Dr. J.A. Hussey. Champoege was chosen by the state of Oregon, as the venue of a park commemorating its past.

In 1852 there were approximately 13,300 souls living in the Oregon Territory. Most of the Ady neighbors, the year Elizabeth was born, were French Canadian, former Hudson's Bay employees and their Indian wives and offspring. Robert Ady had settled on land once owned by Michel LaFramboise, a retired trapper, who had come west with Astor's group, arriving in 1811 on the Tonquin.

The farm house was probably built of logs. Hussey says that by 1852 the Ady property was "well developed, containing a dwelling, shop, barn and cultivated fields.

The 1849 inventory of Phinneas Hunt's property made for his probate lists an "eight day clock". A small wooden chair and violin are in the possession of descendants, and thought to have been carried over the Oregon Trail. A present day inhabitant of the old Ady neighborhood says that a rose growing in her back yard was slipped from one grown by Mary Ann.

From 1855 to 1864, five more children were born to the family: in 1855, Sarah Ann, in 1857, Juliza/Ella/Gerutha, in 1859 Alfred Taylor, in 1861 Josephine Cassiole, in 1864, Jasper N. Twins were also born, dying in infancy.

Elizabeth could read and write well, as is shown in the letter written at a later time to her daughters visiting an aunt in San Francisco. Nothing definite is known of her schooling. Although her mother could not write, her father Robert, could. Gene Geelan, Elizabeth's son, believed that the Ady girls were sent to a Methodist school south of St. Paul.

1861

If the Adys knew domestic tranquility, it was shattered. Toward the end of November, 1861, the entire Pacific Coast of the United States, "from California to northern Washington" received a deluge of rain. West of the Cascade Range in Oregon, the downpour continued for about 18 days. At the close of the month, rising temperatures melted the snow on the mountains, and soon the excess waters were pouring down every tributary into the Willamette Valley. The river rose to terrifying heights. On December 2, it broke over its banks. At Salem it swelled into the town and ran through the streets in a current four feet deep and a quarter of a mile wide. All the lowlands th norward from Albany carried a raging torrent, "sucking and sweeping everything in its path". Downstream at Champoeg, the water is generally said to have flowed over the bottom lands to a depth of seven feet; a height of 55 feet ^{VE} about its lowest level, when the flood crested about Dec. 6. The water was about 30 feet deep in the bottom land depressions. The current was so rapid that no structure could stand against it.

As elsewhere in the valley, the waters rose so swiftly at Champoeg that many persons were marooned in their homes. The flood was followed by a period of extremely cold weather, causing heavy losses among such livestock as survived the raging waters. (This account is from Champoeg, Place of Transition by J.A. Hussey, P. 230-1.)

The St. Paul Mission Historical Society and others in the state have collected pottery fragments and small artifacts taken from the soil around present day Champoeg. It is said that the receding flood waters didn't so much sweep away, as deposit (drop) the things they picked up. For instance, the old Hudson's Bay grain depot survived intact, but 50 feet off its foundations. No other building survived, but the contents... and pieces littered the area. A sign at the present day Champoeg park recommends turning in any artifact found on the park premises.

- 1862 The full impact of the flood on the Ady fortunes is not known. They certainly rebuilt on higher ground. Family life, no doubt, resumed. Prudy Hunt married James Holston of Tennessee, that cold January of 1862. (The 1870 census shows the couple in Champoeg).

The great Civil War raging in the East seems far from the Adys, although several of Robert's nephews and two of his brothers fought on the Union side with Ohio Volunteers. On 6 May 1863, Henry C. Hunt, Elizabeth's half brother enlisted in the Oregon Volunteers, Co. G, First Cavalary. His service record reveals that he remained in the Pacific Northwest until his enlistment was up in 1865.

Lenore/Lenoir, the oldest Ady child, married Ernest Ferdinand Lane in Vancouver 22 Feb 1865. In her father's probate filed in 1887, she is listed "address unknown". The family notes say that she went to South America.

- 1867 Following her syblings example, Elizabeth, with the consent of her father, married John Goodrich of Yamhill County on 12 September 1862. She was fifteen; the groom was twenty-four. He was also of pioneer stock. His family is listed among those who were part of the first party to cross the Barlow Road in 1845. The Goodriches commen^Ced farming near Dayton.
- 1868 On 12 July 1868, their first child, a daughter was born. They named her Mary Agnes.
- 1871 On 25 January 1871, John Goodrich (Elizabeth's husband) died. He was twenty seven years, ten months and three days of age.

A son, John Porter Goodrich, born in 1870 died Nov. 1870

THE GEELANS

1873 After an unknown chain of events, on 19 June, 1873, Elizabeth, a widow, married Patrick Geelan, the bachelor from Cork. The couple took up residence on the groom's St. Paul property which he owned jointly with his partner, Patrick McIntee.

Rev. Delorme, of St. Paul, Parish had performed the wedding ceremony which was witnessed by Patrick Mullen and Caledonia Orton.

The Marion County Oregon probate index entry #872 is entitled, "The Goodrich Guardianship". I have not studied the file. James Holston, Pru Hunt-Elizabeth's step sister's husband) was initially named guardian of Mary Agnes Goodrich. At a later date, Patrick Geelan was named.

Mary Agnes seems not to have been formally adopted, retaining the name Goodrich through the St. Paul Parish Records. She was baptized 4 April 1875. She was not named in Pat's will in 1916. I have not researched the probate of her father, John Goodrich. It is possible that Elizabeth and her daughter owned money or property apart from the Geelans.

1875 On 25 April 1875, Elizabeth was conditionally baptized and received Holy Communion. Her sister, Josephine, was also baptized on 6 October 1878.

Between 1874 and 1883, the Geelan children were born. Birth information is found in this booklet prepared on family group sheets.

It must be noted that as the abstract details, the final purchase of property for the Geelan farm, was made late in the 1870's. As the farm took shape, and as the family grew, the general theme seems to have been prosperity and abundance. At an unknown date, a large house and auxillary farm building were erected, well constructed and forming a compound of nine or ten buildings.

Marie Sprogis Buckles, who lived in the farm house for a time as a child, remembers: 'The house was of a "T" shape, the crossbar of the "T" much enlongated and thickened to accommodate a front room and sitting room built on either side of a steep stairwell. Three bedrooms were adjacent to and opened into the front room. A large kitchen and dining room were back of the sitting room. The kitchen was also partly, at least, in the trunck of the "T".

Behind the kitchen was a well room, with the ground water supply.

Behind was the canning, soap-making and general work room. Beyond was the woodshed. All of the above rooms were under one roof and formed the trunk of the "T".

Upstairs were three more bedrooms. Furnishings included carpeting in the front room, draperies, a settee covered in green velvet, the back of which was in three sections, an organ, a clock and a fireplace.

About twenty five chairs fit around the dining table, for here the hired hands were fed with the family.

Pam Hiller Branch, a great granddaughter, has a picture of two of the Geelan daughters, showing a glimpse of the front room.

Some of the walls of the farm buildings (maybe all of them) were insulated with sawdust. The house was demolished around 1924.

- 1880 One 7 Sept. 1880, Robert Ady left home, never to be heard from again. He was 60 years old when he disappeared. His family had his will probated (Oregon State Archives/Marion County Probate Index #1072). Mary Ann, his wife, was not mentioned in the will.
- 1905 On 3 Feb. 1905, Mary Ann Mitchell Hunt Ady died while visiting her daughter, Prudy Holston who was at the time, living in Portland. A copy of her obituary from the "Oregonian" is included in this booklet. Her funeral was held at the Yergensville Presbyterian Church. She was buried in the Champoeg Cemetery. She had been born in Kentucky in 1823 and was 82 years of age when she died.
- 1909 On 2 Sept 1909, Elizabeth Ady Goodrich Geelan died at the age of 57. She was buried in St. Paul, Oregon.
- 1916 On 22 July 1916, Patrick Geelan died in Portland, Oregon, at St. Vincent's Hospital. His estate record number in the Marion County Index is 4226. Only Margaret Duncan Hiller Sprogis and Marie Sprogis Buckles notes survive telling us the contents of the file, which the county destroyed when the actual will was microfilmed.

The stories of the Geelan children, their marriages and offspring form another chapter and must await another time to be told.

The business of the Geelan Farm was extensive and deserves to be researched thoroughly with an eye to the economy of the state and country during the years it was in full operation.

1989

Only a portion of the Geelan Farm remains in the hands of Geelan descendants. But the haunting beauty of the land endures, for any of us who journey back to see it.

Very often, hearing the Geelan grandchildren talk about the old place, one senses the spirit in which Jennie, then Sister Mary Valere, wrote to her mother, Elizabeth: "Too late to put my hand to the plough and look back --even if I had the least temptation. This is not the case however, but to the absent heart, Mother, far away and alone means far more, dear, than pen can say."

DURING HER LIFETIME, MARGARET DUNCAN HILLER SPROGIS COMPILED NOTES BASED ON MATERIAL IN THE OREGON STATE ARCHIVES AND THE GEELAN DEEDS. THESE NOTES WERE LATER LOVINGLY COPIED BY MARIE SPROGIS BUCKLES AND THEY FORM THE BASIS OF THESE RECOLLECTIONS.

Jennie entered the Holy Name Order, becoming a teacher.

Although assigned at one time to the St. Paul School, she also taught at Spokane and Medford. (and Seattle and probably elsewhere)

With the permission of the Holy Name Order, she was an artist as well as a teacher. Her primary medium was oil on canvas. She gave a painting of Crater Lake, her favorite subject, to each of her siblings.

It is said that one of her "Crater Lakes" was displayed at the Chicago Museum of Art.

In July 1909, Sister Valere wrote a letter to her mother, Elizabeth, which is included here. It offers ample proof of her generous and loving nature, as well as a glimpse into the Geelan family, which would so soon know loss. Elizabeth died two months after the letter was written.

Jennie died in 1928 at age fifty-four. Marie Sprogis Buckles remembers visiting her at St. Vincent's Hospital in Portland during her last illness. Though very frail, she liked to make the Stations of the Cross on the hospital grounds.

She is buried at Marylhurst. During my time at the college in the 1950's, I was often introduced as "Valere's grand neice".

Convent of the Sacred Heart
Seattle, Wn July 9, 1909

My darling Mother,

Your good letter reached me when in Portland. While it conveyed the usual joy of hearing from you, it also brought the first sacrifice of not seeing you, while in the City of Flowers.

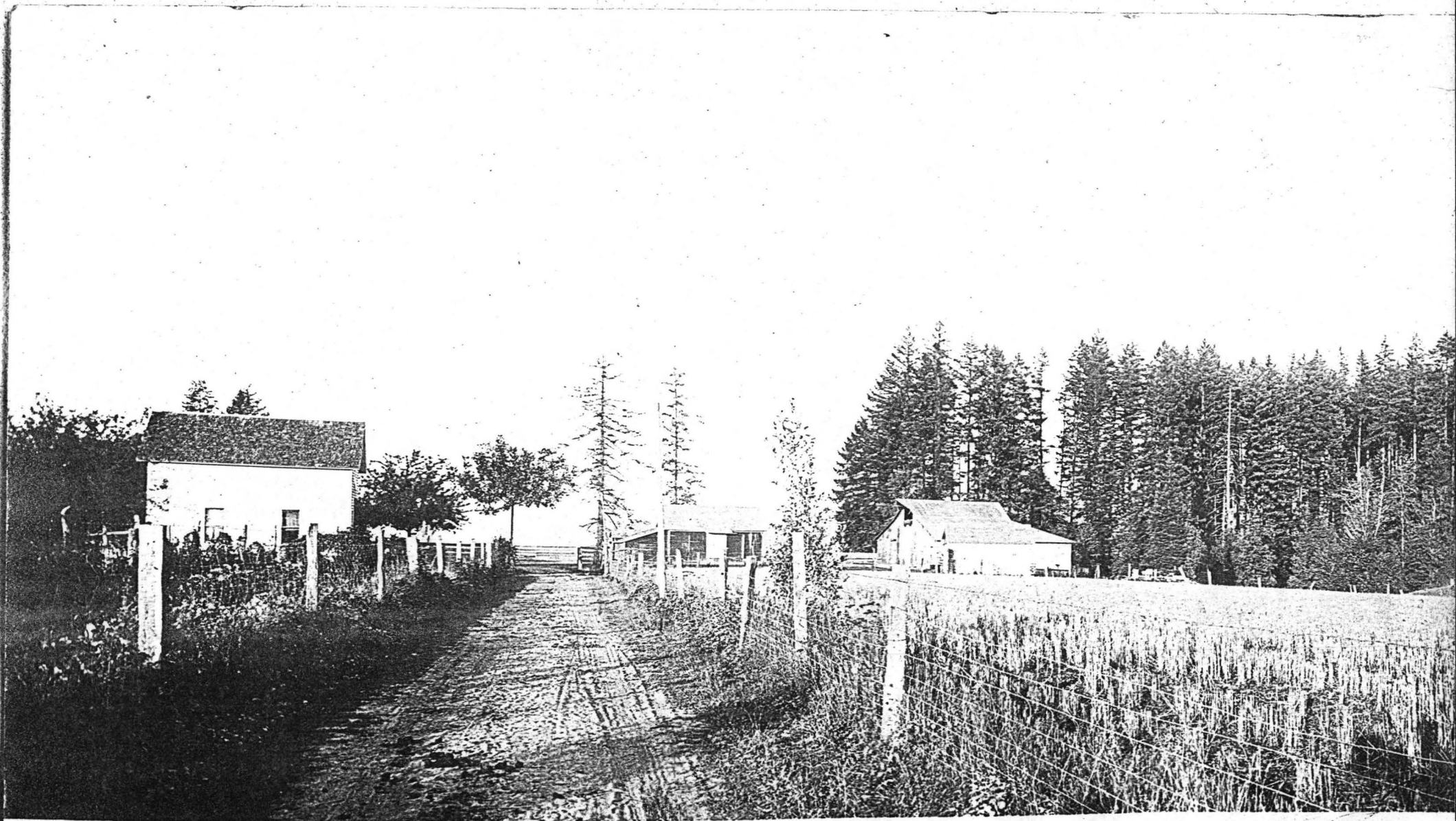

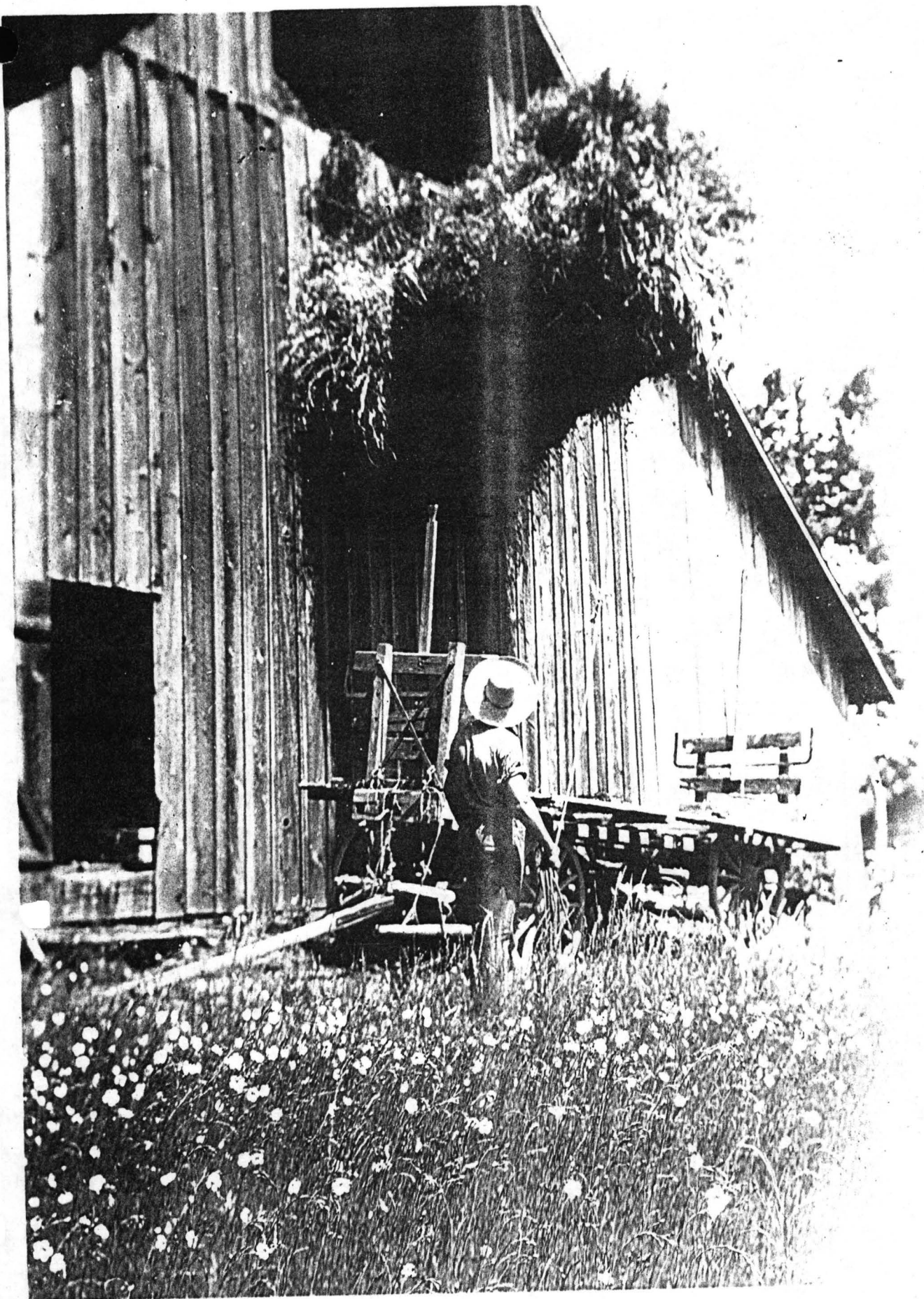

This is an instance where OMB is forcing the VA, against its better judgment, and in a way not consistent with the Administrator's statutory responsibilities, to make a judgment—that the land is “no longer needed by the Veterans' Administration in carrying out its functions”—and to concur in a proposal that is not only a complete sham in terms of fiscal year 1987 revenues but also a short-sighted, ill-advised proposal to dispose of Federal resources that have been dedicated to the benefit of our Nation's veterans.

Mr. President, I am delighted to be joining with my good friend in this initiative. I urge all my colleagues in the Senate to examine carefully the merits of this proposal to prohibit the excessing of the land and to join with us in cosponsoring this legislation.●

I have the honor of serving with Mr. GOLDWATER on the Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs, and there is no individual more dedicated to improving the quality of life for the American Indian than the distinguished senior Senator from Arizona. And, there is no more deserving recipient than Senator GOLDWATER. I should like to take this opportunity to congratulate him. In addition to this honor, the National Congress of American Indians also bestowed a special honor on Mr. Charles Pourier of Pine Ridge, SD. Mr. Pourier is the director of the Shannon County Johnson-O'Malley [JOM] Education Program on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation. Charlie is being honored for his ef-

forts on behalf of Indian schoolchildren across our Nation. He singlehandedly organized the 1985 JOM Mothers March on Washington to lobby Congress to save this important education program which was slated for elimination.

By these efforts he assured the continuation of this program and the services it offers to native American children in South Dakota and across the country. I am pleased that I could join in this effort both as a member of the Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs and the Senate Appropriations Committee to assure that Mr. Pourier's efforts were supported.

Mr. President, while honoring Mr. Pourier's efforts, I should also like to remind my colleagues in the Senate that this program is vital to improving the educational status of Indian children and I urge their continued support for such vital Indian education programs.

Mr. President, I should also like to take this opportunity to salute the work of the National Congress of American Indians [NCAI] under the capable direction of Ms. Susan Shown Harjo. For many years NCAI has been at the forefront of efforts to educate and inform Congress and the American people on the problems and challenges which face American Indians on a daily basis. Much of the Indian legislation passed by the Congress during the past decade was as a direct result of the lobbying efforts of NCAI. I commend Ms. Harjo and her dedicated staff for their continued efforts on behalf of native Americans.●

He was commissioned as a second lieutenant, infantry, and entered on active duty at Fort Benning, GA. He completed the basic and advanced infantry officers courses, parachute course, Ranger course, Command and General Staff College, and U.S. Army War College during his more than 25 years of service. He also earned a master's degree in public administration from Shippensburg University, PA.

His first combat tour in the Republic of Vietnam was as an adviser to the Vietnamese Army and his second Vietnam tour was as a battalion executive officer with the 173d Airborne Brigade. He also served in Germany, first as the director of training, VII Corps, and later as a battalion commander with the Berlin Brigade. After completing the Army War College, he was

assigned as deputy chief of staff, operations for the Sixth U.S. Army.

Colonel Buckles is survived by his wife, Caroline; a daughter, Ann Marie, 17; two sons—Brent, 25, an infantry lieutenant with the 25th Infantry Division, Hawaii, and Kevin, 21—and his mother, Mrs. Marie Buckles of Pocatello, ID.

Colonel Buckles, Infantry, will be remembered by his family and friends as a person of rare competence and compassion who could be depended upon to do what was right for his soldiers, his Army, and his country. May God comfort his family.●

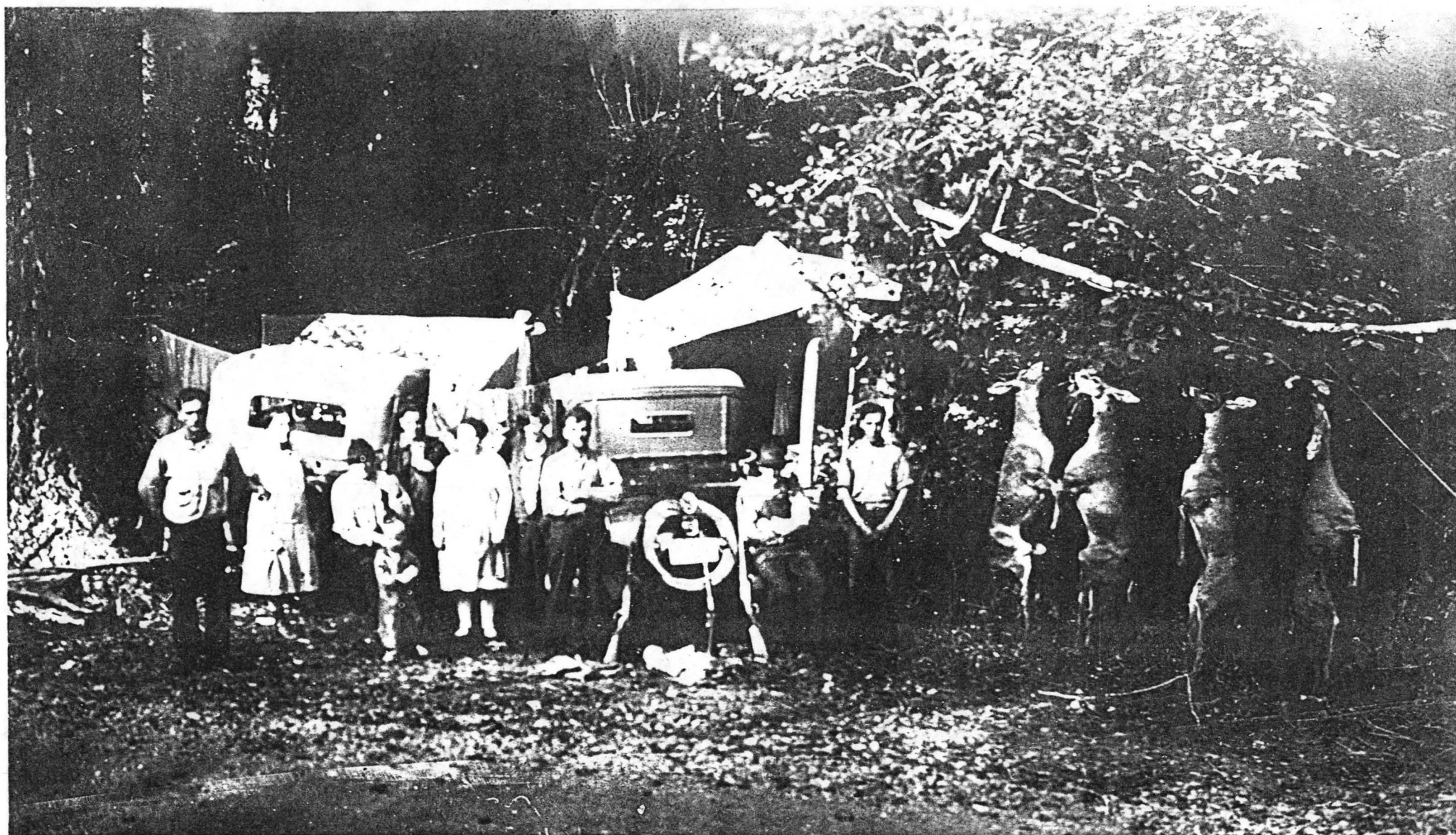

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END IS IN SIGHT

Federal Grand Jury Will Adjourn Monday.

MORE INDICTMENTS COMING

Investigation of Williamson Charges Will Be Finished Today, When Other Cases Will Be Considered.

This week will not see the end of the Federal grand jury, but another day will have to be added to the long space already occupied before the last report is in and the jurors are allowed to return to their homes. It now appears that the witnesses summoned are too many to allow conclusion of the work on Saturday as was intended and the session will adjourn on Monday.

Tuesday morning District Attorney Henry, accompanied by Oliver E. Pagin, special assistant from the Department of Justice; Irvin Rittenhouse, private stenographer to Mr. Henry, and W. J. Burns, will leave for Washington, where Mr. Henry is to argue a motion in the Hydro-Diamond case before the Supreme Court.

Thomas B. Neuhausen, who has been in temporary charge of the Roseburg Land Office since the suspension of J. T. Bridges and J. H. Booth, is now in the city and will be left in charge of the Government headquarters here while Mr. Henry is in Washington.

Mr. Henry Will Return.

The trip of Mr. Henry to Washington will occupy all of a month, after which time he will return to Portland and will not leave until the last of the land-fraud cases has been finished.

It is now thought that the end of this afternoon will see the close of the Williamson investigation which is being conducted by Mr. Henry before the grand jury. A number of witnesses have been examined and more are to come. So far C. Feuerhelm, Floyd Rowel, R. W. Reese, W. T. Fogie, W. A. Bell, Maggie Glaze and T. B. Bingley, of Prineville, and L. H. McMahon, of Salem, have been before the jury, and more will be called today.

It is not expected that the jury will make any report before the latter part of the week. If the investigation against Mr. Williamson is finished today and an indictment is voted, as it is supposed will be the case, it is not likely that the return will be made to the court until Saturday or perhaps Monday.

BURIAL OF PIONEER WOMAN.

Remains of Mrs. Ady Interred at Lone Fir Cemetery.

The funeral of Mrs. Mary Ann Ady, who died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Prudence V. Holston, 491 Railroad street, in Lower Albina, was held in the Presbyterian Church, Champoeg, Monday, and the interment was at Fir Grove Cemetery. Mrs. Ady was one of the few survivors of the immigration of 1844, who came through the Meek cutoff, with Joe Meek as guide. She was 82 years old. Born in Kentucky, 1823, she came with her parents to Illinois when a very young child. Losing her parents, she went to live with her grandparents on what is now called Wall Street, New York. She was married to Phineas R. Hunt, in Keokuk, Ia., and then crossed the plains to Oregon in 1844, and first settled at Hubbard, where she and her husband took up a donation land claim, which now constitutes the town of Hubbard. Her husband went to California in the mining excitement, where he died shortly afterwards in San Francisco. She was married to Robert Ady, also a pioneer of a few years later, and they settled on a farm at Champoeg, which was the oldest farm in that neighborhood. Besides Mrs. Ady, there was but one white woman living in that neighborhood, and the Hudson's Bay Company had its establishment nearby.

Mrs. Ady left her home at Champoeg about three weeks ago to visit her children. She spent two weeks with her daughter, Mrs. Sarah Huffaker, Garden Home, and then came to the home of Mrs. Holston, Albina, where she was taken sick soon after arriving, and grew worse, until she passed away, retaining her faculties to the last. Mrs. Ady was a remarkable woman among the pioneers of the state. Her mind was filled with incidents and she was acquainted with most of the prominent pioneers. Owing to failing health she did not affiliate with the Pioneer Association. She is survived by the following children: Mrs. Prudence V. Holston, Portland; Alfred and Jasper Ady, Champoeg, Or.; Elizabeth Geisland, St. Paul, Or.; Mrs. Sarah Huffaker, of Garden Home, Or.; Mrs. J. M. Poland, of Cottage Grove. There are 24 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren among her descendants.

NEW YORK SHUT IN WITH ICE

Fishing Boats Drift to Sea in Pack—Tugs Rescue Steamer.
