Dr. Zuckerman's Column

There may be snow on the ground but I have summer on my mind - summer camp to be precise. It's not one minute too soon to start planning on a camp vacation for the child or young adult in your family. Processing is in full operation

already.
I believe I speak from experience when I describe the almost inestimable benefits a child that derives from a

derives from a camp vacation.

For many years
I owned a camp in New Hampshire. One of our AHRC members was a camper there.
He still calls me "Uncle George" as he did then. I cherish fond memories of innumerable young. memories of innumerable youngsters who knew me by that name.

But I take particular pride in recalling the boys and girls who were timid, homesick, and dependent when they arrived. They were used to the dangers of city streets and subsequent strict parental discipline and support. Before the season was two weeks old they had bloomed into proudly independent youngsters, bursting with eagerness to share their experiences with visiting relatives, and equally determined show off their recently acquire ability to care for themselves.

Surely the need of retarded children or young adults for this type of experience is none the less urgent. They mature through freedom to participate in outdoor activities without daring the hazards of city streets, traffic, subways and buses. They enjoy indulging in camp sports such as hiking, games, swimming, as much as any so called normal person. Above all they thrill to companionship with their equals, to relaxing and playing with friends on their mental level and with their tastes. These are abiding benefits that only a summer camp can offer to retardates.

No one who witnessed the happiness of the group from the Occupation Day Center who shared a two weeks sojourn at camp last summer can ever for get it. These young adu developed a new concept in your adult socialization. They en They encountered experiences they had never known and they returned to their families just a little bit more adult, more competent and more secure than when they left home - and a lot happier.

I hope that the time is not too distant when all retarded children in the city will enjoy the invaluable experience of spending a vacation at camp with their peer

BOOK REVIEW

"The Other Child" by Richard S. Lewis, Alfred A. Strauss and Laura E. Lehtinen: "The Brain-Injured Child," a Book for Parents and Laymen, Second Revised and Enlarged Edition.

The Other Child has a certain limited appeal to parents, friends and teachers of retarded child-ren regardless of the cause of their affliction. The book was written by a professional writer, Richard S. Lewis (the father of a brain-injured child) in collaboration with Dr. Alfred A. Smith and Laura E. Lehtinen, who were associated with the Cove Schools for Brain-Injured Children at Racine, Wisconsin and Evanston,

The techniques that the authors have worked out for dealing with perceptual and conceptual difficulties of so-called brain-injured children, are applicable to many retarded children particularly hyperactive youngsters; and might enable parents better to prepare their children for group experiences in school and in a recreation program. Con-crete suggestions for parents and teachers appear sound and practical; although some require Bronx
