CAMPAIGN REPORT

FUND RAISING - (Door-to-Door - Coin Boxes).

Under the capable guidance of Mrs. Joseph Gitter, Campaign Director, volunteers were enlisted, indoctrinated and dispatched with dramatic new materials to enlist public support through numerous small contributions. Mrs. Gitter had been warned by the experience of other organizations that 1960 was going to be a particularly difficult year for charitable causes. One after another they reported receipts far below those of last year. Aware of the situation but not dismayed, the Campaign Director simply said, "We must enroll more volunteers so that even if each one brings in less than last year the total will be as great or greater."

In addition to a new brochure which effectively tells the story of retarded children and the part AHRC plays in their habilitation, Mrs. Gitter designed a new canister for placement in shops. The new coin collector is of tin, and therefore opaque, and it has the advantage of taking up very little space (a boon to shopkeepers who need every inch of space) while it yields nothing in appeal value.

The Port of New York Authority collection, another of Mrs. Gitter's enterprises, starts Monday, Nov. 28th and continues through Dec. 10th. To combat the slowdown that has taken place in all non-profit endeavors, the AHRC volunteers who man the booth at the Terminal will work even harder - if that's possible.

**12TH ANNUAL DRIVE
CONTINUING**

The campaign, which started

officially on Oct. 11th, was heralded with a message from Mayor Wagner proclaiming "Retarded Children's Week," and widespread placement (in newspapers including the World-Telegram) of a photograph of Mary Martin and the poster girl, little Kitty Deeley; announcements all day and most of the night on radio and TV; subways and busses displayed 4,000 car cards; the A & P distributed 300 large posters in front window space; department stores all along Fifth Ave., Madison Ave., 57th St., and 34th St. displayed posters in their windows or on the main floor of the store; while six major department stores created special windows. The barrage of publicity was followed by an army of 5,000 volunteers ringing their neighbors' doorbells and asking for contributions.

He told the guests of the importance of the problem - the horrible statistics of its incidence, the progress that has been made and the needs, especially financial, that must be met. Dr. Zuckerman's Column

The 1960 campaign is sailing on under a full head of steam, powered by a corps of five thousand dedicated women who have volunteered their services to help retarded children.

It is hard to find adequate words to thank them, this selfless unpaid army, for taking on the often-frustrating though always-rewarding job of alerting their neighbors, friends and strangers to the terrible problem that confronts a large proportion of our population. Some of the volunteers have only an impersonal knowledge of the dread affliction - yet they ring door bells, cite statistics and appeal to the heart and conscience of others. They plead, yes they even beg for a small sum.

Other volunteers have the heart-breaking problem in their own families; and they prove their determination to erase this terrible affliction from future generations by soliciting contributions even though they are aware that help may come too late for the retardate in their own family.

In my opinion these women are deserving of a somewhat brighter halo and a higher place in the firmament than almost any other group. Theirs is often a distasteful job. Preceded by many other calls from charitable causes, treated with scant courtesy or even open suspicion, these courageous women rise above discouragement to continue on their self-appointed rounds. The only reward they seek is the right to the knowledge that they have played an important part in helping an unfortunate to some of his basic rights - an education that will equip him to fulfill his maximum potential - training that will enable him to become wholly or semi-independent financially - and happiness through companionship with others who share his disability.

The volunteers who serve retarded children have a right to a look at the ledger. Credits - A new project every year since an annual campaign was first undertaken. A promise of more and expanded services to come. Debits - a dept of heartfelt gratitude to every volunteer. Thank you and God Bless You.



Flushing League for the Retarded, Inc. to 170 Members in 3 Years

The Flushing Committee for the Retarded, Inc. is a mere three years old; but it's as lusty an infant auxiliary as you are likely to find. Just ten young women, neighbors all, whose knowledge of retardation for the most part was hearsay not personal involvement, got together at the home of one of them to form the Committee.

As parents of normal children, many of them felt that their own good fortune obligated them to help less fortunate children to achieve some measure of productive self-expression and happiness. Since they were parents of normal children, for the most part, they called in experts to assist them to formalize a group of friendly neighbors into an organization with the legal right to raise funds to help retarded children, whose special care they had taken upon themselves.

The experts they called in were well chosen - George Hirsch, current President of the N.Y.C. Chapter of AHRC, Jerry Weingold, now Executive Director of New York State's AHRC, and Mrs. Walter E. Kraus, now Donor Chairman and Member of the Board of Directors.

Let's take a look at the organization three years later. The 170 members can not meet at one another's houses. No house is big enough - so they meet at Electchester in Flushing, on the 4th Monday of the month in the evening. After a short business meeting, there is a program followed by refreshments. Interesting speakers, films, and entertainment have kept attendance as well as enthusiasm at a consistently high level.

This group of dedicated women has done more than raise funds to help retarded children. Their example has aroused sympathy and understanding for the retarded among their families and friends. For instance, Mrs. Sarah Adler, First Vice President in charge of fund raising, not only dreams up fund raising schemes and puts them into operation, but she inspired her son, Ira, in company with Jerry Melnick, the son of the President, to serve as a councilor at Derry Downs Summer Camp for the retarded and emotionally disturbed. Jerry has become so interested in his mother's charitable work that he plans to study clinical psychology with a view to working with the retarded after he graduates from Fairleigh Dickinson Law School.

14 1/2 year old Ruth Melnick's contribution was the slogan adopted by the Flushing Committee - "Help Us Help the Retarded." Mrs. Africk's daughter, Shelley, inaugurated a Junior League last year to help the retarded.

A fine unique project that the Flushing Committee undertook last year was a social group program for retarded adolescents, 12 to 14 years old. This age has been neglected in the past; and it is one of the most difficult for normal children and retarded alike. The AHRC screened the youngsters to select those who could benefit most from the experience; then hired a professional group leader. Meetings were held at Electchester. EACH RETARDED ADOLESCENT WAS PICKED UP AT HIS HOME BY A MEMBER OF THE FLUSHING COMMITTEE AND DELIVERED BACK SAFELY! In addition to supporting the project, the Flushing Committee supplied refreshments; while two members served at every meeting as assistants to the group leader.

This social group hadn't yet started its program when Mrs. Melnick was interviewed. She said that many of the youngsters and their mothers had called her to ask when meetings would begin. They had looked forward all week to these Wednesday meetings. At the last meeting of the season, every child brought his parents, an unheard of representation. One of the group acted as Mistress of Ceremonies. "When she welcomed the parents, I got goose

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EDITORIAL

"Moving Day" at the Training Center and Sheltered Workshop marks a plateau from which AHRC can look down with pride, and up with confidence. This is the second time we have had to move in order to keep up with the pressing demand for larger space to accommodate more trainees. What started out in small quarters in Brooklyn as a tentative effort to test whether or not vocational training could be effective in habilitating retarded young adults who had never worked before, has succeeded beyond the warmest hopes of those who instigated the project. It has snowballed like an avalanche into more than 100 Workshops situated all over the country, patterned after the pilot operation set up by the New York City Chapter of AHRC.

In congratulating ourselves on this, our latest achievement, a move that will enable us to service 40% more trainees than we did at 27th St., we must never lose sight of the ultimate goal - a Training Center and Sheltered Workshop with a building of its own, one with space enough to contain all the young people who could benefit from vocational training.

WNYC Devotes 15 Minutes to AHRC

The discussion dealt with the concrete projects maintained by the Association, and how each contributes to the welfare of the retardate, his family and the

community. The Training Center and Sheltered Workshop was described in some detail to give listeners an idea of the physical setup as well as the type of work done there, and the effect on the trainees.

In addition to information about the various programs of AHRC, the interview brought out some of the economic facts of life that are so little known. The closing speech by Mr. Tobias was, "According to Surgeon General Burney, if proper facilities can be developed, more than 84% of the retarded can become contributing members of society. We are far from the goal of adequate services for the retarded, but through the continued work of our Association, each year we are trying to make available more and better facilities, to meet their needs as future self-supporting citizens."

Group Work Programs

A growing program of leisure time activities with interest and meaning for its participants is now under way under the auspices of the Group Work Department. This program includes some Fun Groups for the 8 to 12 year old, clubs for the teen agers and small groups for the young adults.

The club groups are under the leadership of trained social workers, teachers and psychologists. Several of the groups have had parent meetings and others are planning to do so. The parent meetings have concentrated on how parents and staff can best work together to enhance the activity growing out of the club program.
