Republicans socialize; Taft speaks

Sen. Robert Taft, Jr. was the guest speaker before an audience of more than 450 persons at the Ashland County Republican Lincoln Day Dinner Saturday evening in the Convocation Center.

Senator absent

U.S. Senator John V. Tunney, scheduled to speak in AC's Visiting Lecture Series Tuesday morning, cancelled his engagement because an important vote was scheduled in the Senate Judiciary Committee that morning.

According to Erma Wright, director of the Ashland College news bureau, "Efforts are being made to reschedule the senator's speech for Feb. 29 at the same time."

The 36 year old senator from New York also serves on the public works and District of Columbia committees.

Taft, who was featured among many presentations, introductions and remarks, charged that the criticism of President Nixon's latest peace proposal showed a "Lack of responsibility."

"Every American is free to speak his piece," Taft said, "But, when he is a leading candidate, I think he has a certain responsibility to moderate what he says so as to not undercut efforts to end the war and make progress

on the prisoner of war question." The Ohio senator was referring to the critical statement made recently by Sen. Edwin Muskie.

Taft told the gathered Republicans, "I think we can be proud of our record. This is an issue we can and must take to the people."

Wind ensemble to perform


Some of the finest traditional and contemporary concert music will be represented by the Ashland College Symphonic Wind Ensemble Sunday.

New committee started

ABC to divide \$300,700 fees

The Activities Budget Committee (ABC) will be dividing \$300,700 among student organizations from the student activity fee next term.

An estimated 2,425 students will be attending AC next fall. The activity fee is \$124 per student per year. The distribution of the monies, which must be done before the end of the 1972-73 term, involves such organizations as the Student Senate, Collegian, Pine Whispers, SUBG, athletics, health services and the dramatics area.

ABC met initially Tuesday afternoon in an attempt to allocate student activities funds to divisions, departments and organizations which provide ser-

vices and/or programs for the campus community.

The committee is made up of four students and four faculty members as the eight voting members. Other non-voting members include a secretary, and presiding administrators George Guiley, dean of student life, and Robert Bingham, business manager.

Students representing an overall consensus of the campus are representatives Linda Scott, secretary, freshman class; Margie Dowds, secretary, sophomore class; Stu Johnson, senior treasurer; and Jim Gingery, vice president, freshman class.

The faculty members voting on all student allocations are Tom Shockney, assistant professor of business; Gloria Holmes,

associate professor of elementary education; Donald Rinehart, assistant professor of religion; and Marilyn Troxel, assistant professor of biology.

The students were selected from all class leaders who showed an unbiased interest in the new committee and who were not voting members of the Student Senate. It was noted that no representatives from the junior class became involved.

Students leaders selected the representatives after private conferences with each. Selecting and organizing the committee, in association with Dean Guiley, were Gary Thompson, senate treasurer; Don Freeborn, senate social vice-president; Robert Dye, SUBG chairman; Bob Faurot, (Continued on page 2)
