BASEBALL

It appears that the Eagles are headed for one of their best seasons ever. The team is currently 12-2-1 with only 10 games left to be played. AC is 4-0 in league play with only four remaining in the MOC.

Little Ed Barney is continuing his hitting rampage with an average of .457. Ed has hit safely in 10 out of the 13 contests he has played in. The outfielder has collected 19 singles and two doubles.

Freshman Gary Moose has pulled his average above the .400 mark by getting 11 base knocks in the last five games. The slugger leads the squad in runs batted in with 11 and also in extra base hits with seven. He has gone hitless in only two games thus far.

Although his average has been dropping, Dick Murray has knocked in 10 runners this year. The speedster has been hitting in "clutch" situations. Another big RBI man is Ron Lucas. The sophomore has hit in nine while getting three doubles and three triples. The catcher is doing an excellent job this year as shown by the fact that he is starting over Mike Hannah, a fine receiver.

Boze Johnson has moved into coach Donges' clean-up spot in the batting order for good reason. The little infielder has scored 18 runs, batted in 10, has four extra base hits, and has walked nine times.

The fine Eagle pitching staff has permitted less than two earned runs per game this season. Jay Pressler leads the team in strikeouts with 61. The left-hander pitched 14 straight innings in the last two weeks without letting up an earned run until he was hit by Bluffton in the ninth inning. John Rhoads has been pitching great baseball this year. He is now boasting a 4-1 record. The fireballer has walked only 16 foes in 42 innings. John Freshley and Steve Lengel have pitched brilliantly in starting and relieving roles.

Track

The big and little of the Eagles have been having a record-breaking contest. Ed Knittle, 6-4 junior weighing in at 207, broke Ron Thompson's discus record and he then went on to break his own mark twice. Knittle is now boasting a toss of 128-1.



Bob Esmont, 5-6 freshman, once broke Knittle's discus mark and he now owns the shot put title of 43-3½. The Ezzy vs Knittle feud will continue through five more meets and until the final meet is over "may the best man win."

Speaking of records, there are many more in danger of being shattered this year. Larry Aulger has already broken the 440 mark and Bill Worcester the pole vault. Bruce Thomas, improving at every meet, is nearing the broad jump record which has been standing for the past 12 years. Rick Erdmann is also within jumping distance of Thomas and the mark held by Don Drebus. Steve Gilbert is out to break his own records in the high and low hurdles. Steve's 1962 marks will surely be renewed in the near future. Gene French has had knee ailments all season but he may be in shape to endanger some of his own records. The junior has the school's best times in the 100 and the 220-yard dashes.

Most of the points scored by Ashland this year in track and field was tallied by the field men. Knittle and Esmont are always good for a first or second in their specialties. Worcester, Thomas, and Dave Smalley (high jump) usually pick up their share of points which we hope will increase as time passes.

GOLF

John Ford and Dave Bogniard have been supplying the Eagle golfers with low scores and many points to send the team into the final three matches with a 4-4 mark. Ford is the low man for the season thus far with an average of just under 79. Bogniard is averaging 82. The Eagles now have six linksters who can steadily shoot in the 70's and 80's. One of them, Donna Kozar, is not permitted to participate in the MOC matches. Why? Because she is a female, of course.

The team has a good chance to win the MOC play and also win the district to get the privilege of traveling to Iowa for a national tourney. AC has beaten all these teams in competition this year so far. Ace golfer Ford says, "With a team effort like that shown at the Ohio State tourney, we could easily make the trip to Iowa."

AC GOLFERS BEAT B. W. AND MALONE

Wins over Baldwin-Wallace and Malone give coach Martinnelli's golf team a 4-4 record after a slow start this year. The team scored an amazing 20-0 shut-out over Malone and they edged BW, 11-9. The Eagles also made a good showing in the Ohio Intercollegiate Golf Tournament at Ohio State.

The win over BW on April 27 was sparked by John Ford and Dave Bogniard. Both linksters shot a 77, Ford getting four points and Bogniard 3½. Ted Fauber's 79 was good for 3½ points. Ron Shepherd had 44-40 for an 84. Ron was followed by Weldon who had an 85.

On May 3 AC trounced Malone, 20-0. The Ford-Bogniard combination was a winning one. Both golfers knocked out 78's. The other four-point winners

were Fauber (83), Weldon (86), and Bob Swartz (90).

Last year's entry from AC finished last in the Ohio Intercollegiate Golf Tournament. This year it was a different story. The 1963 linksters placed 18th out of a field of 27 teams on May 6. Tourney winner was Ohio University; runner-up was Bowling Green. Ashland's 645 topped other MOC schools plus ones such as Ohio Northern, Rio Grande, Otterbein, and Mt. Union. The 27-hole tourney started at 6 a. m. Bogniard led AC with 122 strokes. He was closely followed by Jim Weldon with a 125. Ford (130), Fauber (131), Shepherd (137), and Swartz (139) also competed.

AMISH PAINTINGS DISPLAYED IN COLLEGE LIBRARY

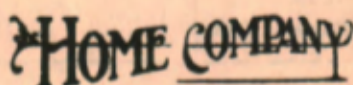
