

Dr. Harold Yochum to address graduates

Dr. Harold L. Yochum, president emeritus of Capital University, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon and be awarded an honorary doctorate at the 91st annual commencement exercises on June 7.

The baccalaureate service will be held in the new Convocation Center at 9 a.m. This will be the first program in the convocation center equipped to hold 3,000-4,000 persons.

Dr. Yochum was president of Capital University from 1946 to

1969. He holds honorary degrees from Capital University, Central State College, Wilberforce, Pacific Lutheran University, Parkland, Washington and Denison University.

In 1953, he was selected as one of the "Ten Outstanding Men in Columbus" and in 1962 received the Boy Scouts of America Lamb Award.

Dr. Yochum received his formal education at Capital University (1923, AB) Ohio State University (1924, AM) and

Evangelical Lutheran Theological Seminary, Columbus (1928, BD).

Active in academic, civic and service organizations, he was president of the Ohio College Association (1957-58), a member of the Ohio Council on Teacher Education since 1959; secretary (1950-54) and chairman (1954-55) of the Ohio Foundation of Independent Colleges.

Dr. Yochum is currently president of the Association of Independent Colleges and Uni-

versities of Ohio and a member of the Board of Directors of the Ohio Chamber of Commerce. He was chairman of the 1956 TB Christmas Seal Sale, a member of the Governor's Advisory Council, Atomic Energy for the State of Ohio in 1956, 1958, and 1960.

A former pastor of Lutheran churches in Hessville and Detroit, Mich., he is a member of the executive committee of the National Lutheran Education Conference.

Dr. Yochum is the author of two books of sermons and contributes to many church publications.

In addition to recognizing excellence in academic and athletic accomplishments or leadership in school or community activities, the program included the announcement of awards usually presented at the Class Day and President's Cup Banquet. These two events were not held this year.

When installing Bill Catalano as president of the Ashland College Student Senate, President Glenn L. Clayton said, "I want to pledge my support to you and your associates here on the Senate. I have always felt that the close relationship between the administration and the student representatives was most important and I feel that more than ever today."

In addition to Catalano, Student Senate officers installed by President Clayton were vice president, Bernard Whitmore; treasurer, Ken Unger; corresponding secretary, Jenny Lawson and recording secretary, Maggie Ruckman.

Dr. Clayton presented the gavel, symbol of authority, to Bruce Cramer, newly elected president of the Interfraternity Council.

Also he named Phi Delta Theta fraternity as winner of the President's Cup this year. "I suggest we continue to have the fine spirit of competition that has existed between the four very wonderful fraternities. It is a pleasure to encourage the fine ideals that are portrayed in this President's Cup competition," President Clayton said.

Carol Johnson, editor elect of the Collegian, was named the

outstanding sophomore woman and presented with a gold charm. Donna Berry received the Math Club scholarship.

Treasury assistant to get degree June 7

Dr. Charles E. Walker, under secretary of the treasury of the United States, will address the 91st Ashland College graduation class and receive an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from Ashland College.

Commencement exercises will be held on the north lawn of the campus on June 7 at 3 p.m.

The commencement speaker was sworn in as under secretary of the treasury in a Jan. 27, 1969 ceremony in the Treasury Department. He had been executive vice president of the American Bankers Association since 1961.

He is an alumnus of the University of Texas which granted him bachelor and master of business administration degrees in 1947 and 1948, respectively.

In his early career, Dr. Walker was an instructor (1947-48) in finance and later assistant and associate professor (1950-54) at the University of Texas in the interim teaching at the Wharton School of Finance of the University of Pennsylvania from which he received a doctor of philosophy degree in economics in 1955.

Dr. Walker became an associate economist at the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia in 1953. He moved to the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas the following year where in the period 1958-61 he was vice president and financial economist.
