29.6% of Freshmen in Elem. Ed. Field

This year's freshman class at Ashland College is composed of students coming all the way from New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and Ohio, and across the Atlantic from Greece.

Percentage-wise, the male members of class of '57 out number the female members by 17.6%.

29.6% of the incoming freshman class will major in elementary education, with business administration ranking second with 10.4%. Close behind were pre-engineering, liberal arts and physical education with 9.8% of the class having chosen each of these fields. 4.1% of the class will major in music, 3.3% in general business, 2.4% each in secondary education, secretarial science, pre-seminary, pre-medicine and pre-dentistry, and 1.6% each in the fields of pre-law, science, social service, home economics, speech, art and journalism.
