MORE GROWTH IN 1966

Expansion plans of the next unit of The Moorings are under way, and progress already is noticeable. "We anticipated getting under way in January, but the clearing work by bulldozers began early in December and the draglines moved in two weeks later," said President H. Milton Link.

City and County planning boards have checked the preliminary plans. Zoning, streets, water and sewer systems will be equal to or better than the requirements of either City or County.

The new area covers one-half mile of Trail and Gulf frontage, comprising 300 acres of land. To all intent and purpose, it will be an extension of the present Moorings.

No timetable has been established for completion, Link said, but more information probably will be available in April. A sales plat of roughly the first one hundred acres may be ready by April, he said.

"If property continues to sell at its present pace—and we expect this winter will be one of our busiest seasons—there will be few, if any, Moorings homesites left by Spring," Link said. "With this in mind, we will proceed as rapidly as possible with the orderly development of this next phase of our development."

January will be "Know Your Neighbor" month, so look out for the interviewer. He or she will be ringing your doorbell soon!




The Milton Links' new home being built at 393 Windward Way.

A number of valuable prizes will be awarded to the winner of this one-day tournament.



To the Tavern-on-the-Green






