






The new welcoming sign on First Street welcomes all visitors to Immokalee.

Coming to the high school is like starting all over again.


"Being a freshman is like being a sixth grader again," agrees Monica Bradly, "because the older kids look down on us."


Education


Everyone is a necessary for a play to happen and without Orlando Samarippas, the light technician, everybody would really be in the dark!






Motivation






Perhaps the most memo-

Win or lose, there was always a traditional game of Down Macaroni Deo to be played on the ride home and the next match down the road with the spirit to continue a new winning tradition.






With speed, heart, and determination the Girls' Track Team felt no **Limitations**


The Conclusion
