


the last year of the century and millennium.


A Disney theme to remember!







work at school.


"My favorite day of the weekend is Saturday, because I still have one more free day to go," said senior Daphne Clark. Some kids like to spend the



fashion items have returned to in the nineties. Many students have gone wild wearing them.






"It's fun. I get to be known around the community," senior Rigo Villa said about his job. He works at Leal's Tire Shop every day except Sunday.


Counting papers at Florida Rural Legal Services is Vicky Ramos. This was one of the afterschool jobs provided by the migrant program to help students with financial problems.






The T.V. production class began to broadcast the daily announcements on live








Newcomer Lisa Ramos experiences the stressful task of being a journalism member. Journalism helps you understand the reasons for being organized and having good time management.








Freshman Miguel Benavides anticipates video worthy events during the pep-rally. WIHS news was a new program that many students were involved in.





In their positions, the chorus is ready to sing a song. The theme song of Titantic is just one of the many songs that they sing.


Going over last night's Algebra II homework is Martha Jose. The class was intended to help students learn to solve real world problems. "Alegebra II makes me think," said Martha.

In the years to come computers will be the main source of communication in many parts






A Bit About Two Worlds




So, now can you think of anything more exciting than a science or social studies class. With an open imagination, students can see what many before them have also seen--a two separate worlds with much to offer.







In every school there must be a strong team of leaders to orchestrate school functions and activities, and this school is no exception.



One Step Up





At the end of the school year, all of the events and special occasions will have gone smoothly all because


members of the executive boards take the time to work out the details for the student body.



Lunch time is the hour of preference for most executive boards to meet. The Sophomore Executive Board meets in the activities dining room for a discussion on how to raise money.




T.V. Production is both a class and

Have you ever wondered why the stars come out at night? Do you find yourself studying all the time? If so, you may be a prime candidate for membership in the science club or renaissance program.





During the Beta dinner meeting, Chevas Marshall chows down on a great meal. He has been in Beta for the past three years.




think about the extra challenge?





















"I get very excited about driving a hole and I try to make our team win as much as possible," said Richard Burgess.













At the start of a tournament, the wrestling team lines up on the mat. Before matches, each team member's name and weight class is announced.


















know what they're doing. The Indian girls show they could do it when they played against Clewiston and won. Having a victorious game brightens up their seasonal spirit.


The varsity team started off with a loss, but they are not worried about it. They expect this year to be the best. "I think this


