From its inception in 1986, the Friends of the Collier County Museum has striven to make our Museum a true showplace. Beginning with an aggressive development campaign supported from many sides, the Collier County Museum was successfully relocated to a new facility more than doubling its original size. Since that time, the Friends have provided technical support and gained funding from multiple sources to continually improve the scope and level of the Museum's collections and exhibitions.

Now at the Museum because of the Friends . . .

The 1910 Logging Locomotive A vintage steam locomotive and coal tender representing the early cypress logging industry.

Craighead Laboratory The restored field laboratory of this noted Everglades' scientist and scholar is a fully working laboratory enabling on-site assessment and conservation of the Museum's artifact collection, research, identification, and proper exhibit preparation.

Carolyn Craighead Orchid House This recent addition is devoted to the wondrous orchids and botanical specimens unique to Southwest Florida.

Swamp Buggy Exhibit The modern swamp buggy is well-known in Collier County, but many people may be unaware of its past. This fully restored buggy from the 1920's gives guests a first hand look into the history of this useful vehicle.

Native Florida Garden Adjacent to the Craighead Laboratory, this teaching garden features a wealth of tree and plant communities native to southern Florida. The garden is a living memorial to the work of Dr. Frank C. Craighead.

Victorian Gazebo Dedicated to the memory of Gerald L. Lanterman, one of the founding members of the Friends, this beautiful gazebo accents the grounds and provides an enjoyable resting area in the midst of the gardens and exhibits.

George G. Huntoon Gallery This 1940's era Naples home permanently displays the extensive marine and wildlife collection of Dr. Earl L. Baum.

Children's Discovery Cottage This unique learning resource is centered in a 1926 Naples home. Equally significant to the historical content is the hands-on learning features within Discovery Cottage. Intended to assist educators, the exhibit moves students beyond text books to observation and primary research of regional history.

Lecture Hall This multi-purpose facility offers Museum guests a rotating series of limited engagement exhibits, lectures, film programs, and special activities geared to visiting groups.

Bruce and Annie Haldeman Research Library The museum's non-circulating library contains a growing collection of books, documents, and research materials on the history of Collier County and Florida. The library is open to the public by appointment.
