HUNTOON GALLERY DEDICATED

On Saturday, November 5, 1994, Mrs. George G. Huntoon and two of her sons formally dedicated the Museum's newest addition, the George G. Huntoon Gallery.

An outstanding civic leader, historian and conservationist, George Huntoon (1913-92) served as a driving force behind the creation of the Collier County Museum and the preservation of historic Palm Cottage.

Dedication guests and members of the Collier County Historical Society included Timothy J. Constantine, Chairman of the Collier County Board of Commissioners; Charles Dauray, president of the Historical Society; and John E. Reble, president of the Friends of the Museum. Final preparations for showing the gallery were made by a team of talented volunteers, led by Friends board members Lynn Wuesthoff and Susan Storter.

The ambitious undertaking began in April 1993, when the Collier County Historical Society acquired the 1930s Naples residence of Henry Espenlaub and relocated the building and garage onto the Museum's grounds. A key feature of the \$50,000 restoration was the joining of the interior rooms to create a single gallery, reminiscent of Dr. Earl L. Baum's popular trophy room. The project will open to the public as a permanent memorial to George G. Huntoon and an exhibit gallery for Dr. Baum's extensive collection of marine and wildlife specimens.

HOMEGROWN HISTORY HIGHLIGHTS

January 7, 1927:

The first passenger train, the Orange Blossom Special, arrives in Naples carrying Florida Governor John W. Martin.

January 10, 1931:

First "talking movie" is shown in Naples.

January 17, 1924:

The pier at Naples is doubled in length to 1,000 feet.

January 19, 1953:

City residents organize The Naples Players, a community theater troupe.

January 22, 1889:

Rose Cleveland, sister of President Grover Cleveland, is the first guest to register at the Naples Hotel.

February 11, 1968:

Everglades Parkway, better known as "Alligator Alley," opens to traffic.

February 15, 1978:

The Collier County Museum opens at the County Government Center in East Naples.

February 25, 1953:

Naples' first dial-tone telephones go into service.

February 26, 1896:

Anthropologist Frank Hamilton Cushing begins his excavation of the Calusa Indian site on Marco Island.

March 3, 1945:

Florida is admitted to the Union as the 27th state.

March 13, 1939:

Barron Gift Collier, the founder of Collier County, dies in New York City, just 10 days before his 66th birthday.

March 15, 1944:

Lee Tidewater Cypress Company ships its first train load of cypress logs north from the logging town at Copeland.

March 23, 1873:

Barron Gift Collier is born in Memphis, Tennessee.
