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





## ENDANGERED SPECIES OF FLORIDA

### Phil Fisher to exhibit wildlife paintings




An exhibit of paintings of the wildlife and natural environment of Collier County, opens February at the Collier County Museum.

"I've been a nature lover since my first breath," the artist reflected, "I've worked with animals all my life. South Florida, the Everglades and the Big Cypress areas hold an intriguing fascination for me. Most Floridians are so unaware of this vast land of beauty and bounty that lies in their backyard. Perhaps through my work, I can bring people a little closer to it and help them understand more."

Fisher's paintings convey a sense of realism combined with impressionism. "Through my paintings I create the essence of this life without getting lost in a lot of details; this way ones eyes focus on the subject while only background colors and shades give us a visual truth," he explained.

A co-founder of the Endangered Species Research Foundation, Inc. a local non-profit group, Fisher currently serves as its vice-president. The organization's goal is to help endangered animals of Florida through research and environmental education programs. Co-founder Jim McMullen has been actively tracking and studying the Florida Panther, an animal which features prominently in Fisher's work.



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## ON THE HORIZON

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Mark your calendars for the EVERGLADES CITY SEAFOOD FESTIVAL, to be held in front of the Everglades City Hall on February 5 and 6. Sponsored by the Everglades City Volunteer Fire Department, this annual event will feature rides for children, arts and crafts, alligator wrestling and members of the local Seminole Indian families displaying their handicrafts. A country-western band will provide entertainment, with guest appearances by other local bands. The famous fish dinner will of course be provided, starting at 11:30 on Saturday and at 12:00 on Sunday. If you've never been to Everglades City, take this opportunity to visit this charming and friendly town.

For those with a hankering to head on down the Trail, don't forget the Old Island Days Celebration, Key West. Running for 7 weeks, from Feb. 1 through the third week in March, this celebration of Key West's colorful and unique history has something for every taste. "Conch around" Old Town and savor the architecture of this historic town. Tours of historic houses are held regularly, including the Audubon and Hemingway homes. The historic turtle kraals house the largest turtle in captivity(!) and illustrate one of Key West's pioneer industries. Other lighthearted activities include a conch shell blowing contest, a key lime pie eating contest, the 5th annual Last Resort Marathon race and buccaneer treasure days.
