For many years it has been the custom of the Associated Students of the Monrovia-Arcadia-Duarte High School to publish an annual called the "Monroviaan."

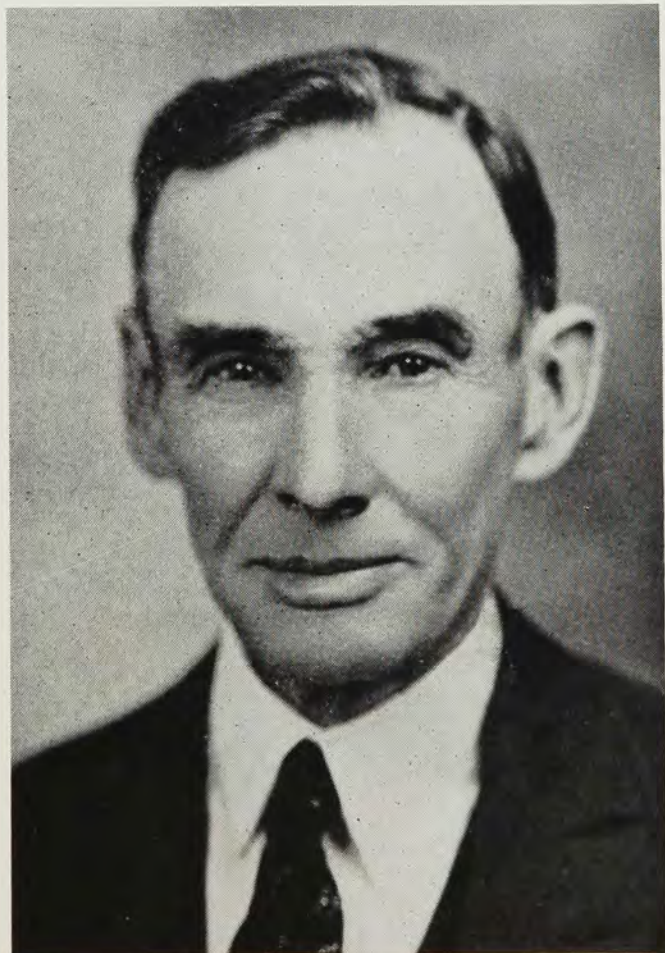

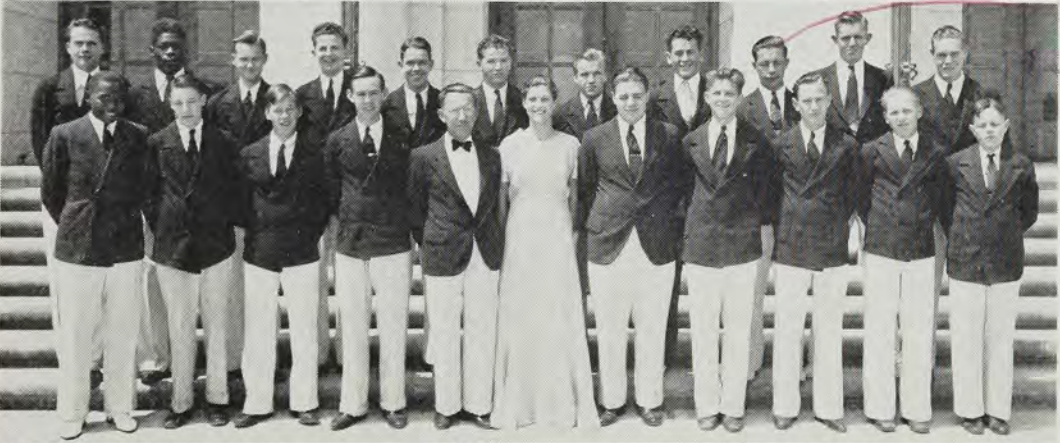
The officers for the year have been: Persis Kent, president; Merle Scott, treasurer; Lucille Moore, and Mary Ann Gierlich, Social Chairmen.

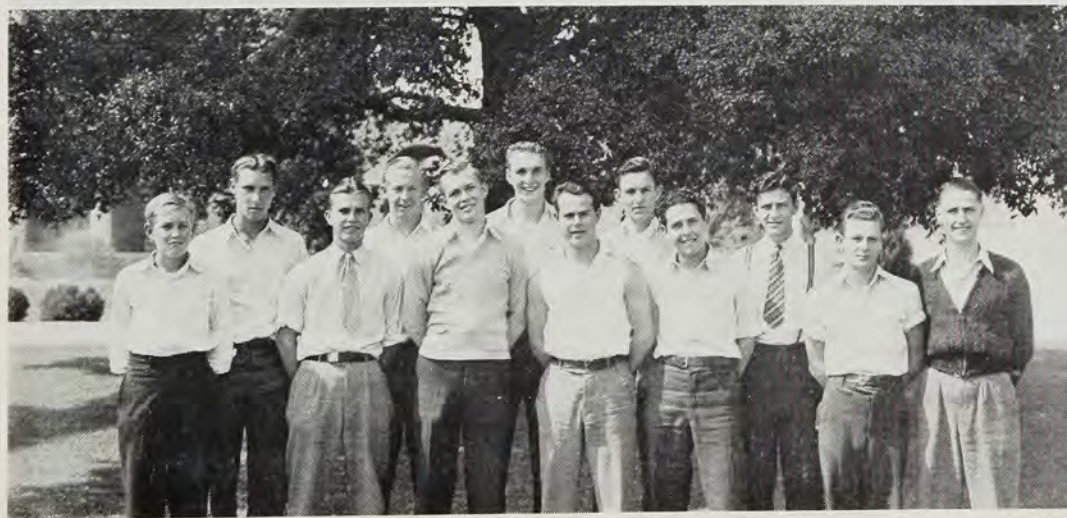

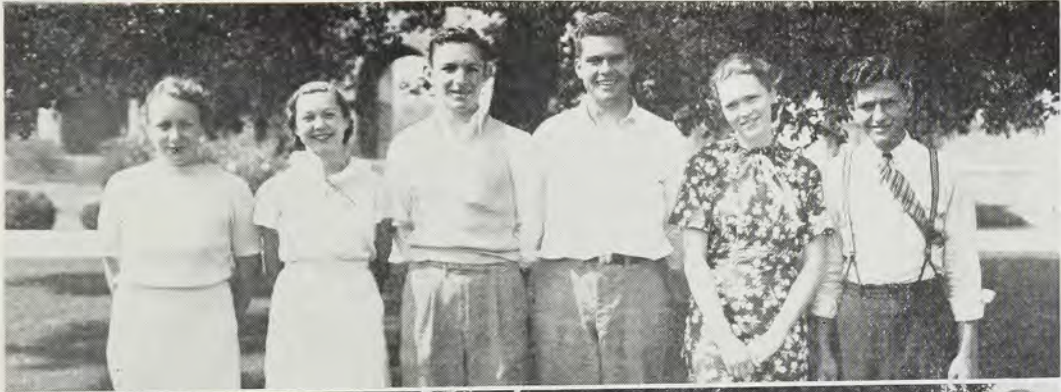
SENIOR PLAY

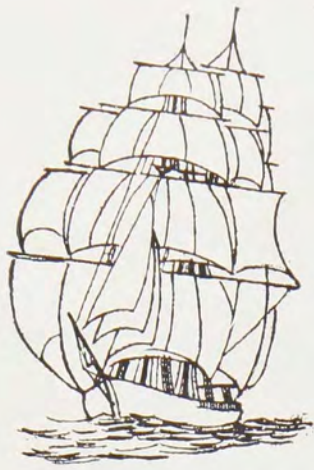

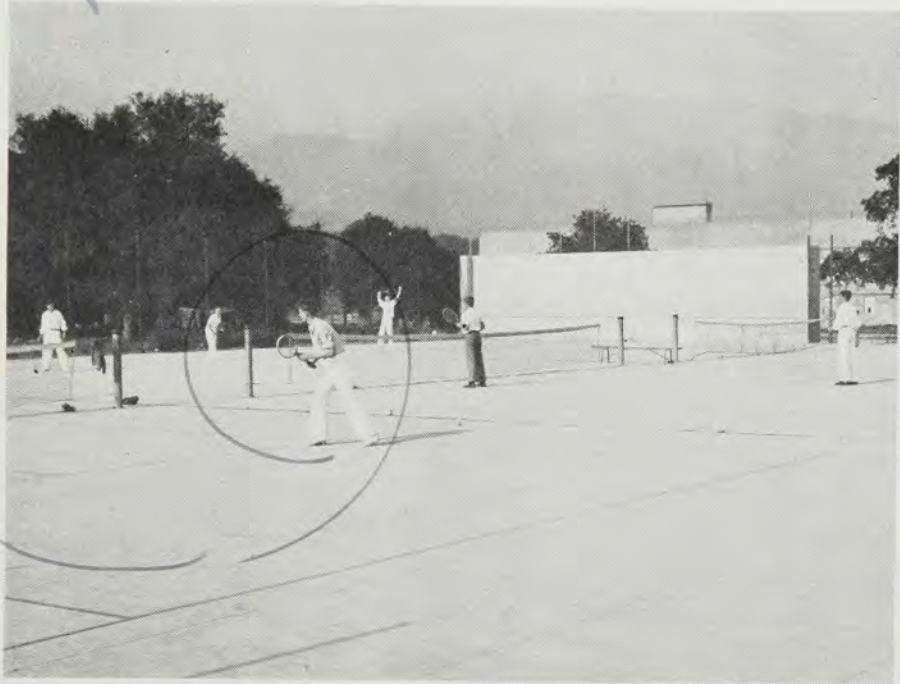

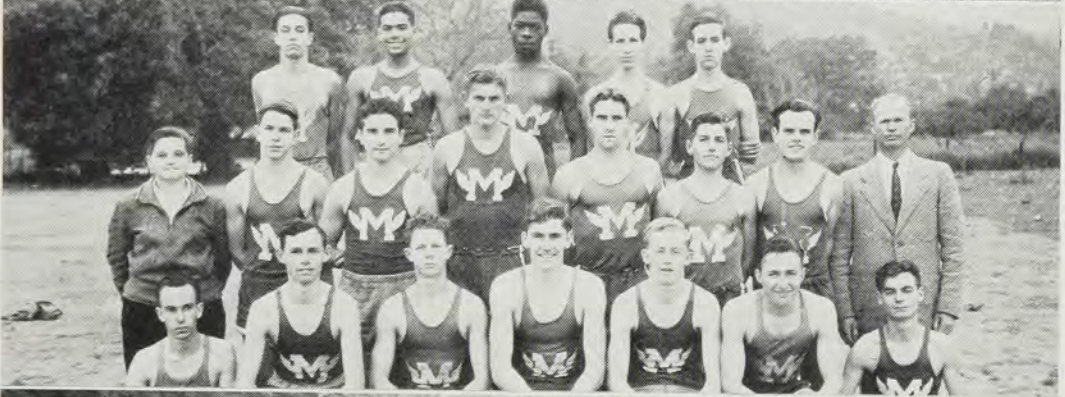
The Monrovia Baseball team ended its season by tying for second place in the league standing for the championship.

High point girls were Mary E. Graham and Anita Stefano, who earned 20 points each.

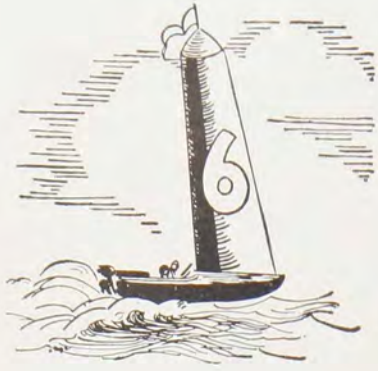
