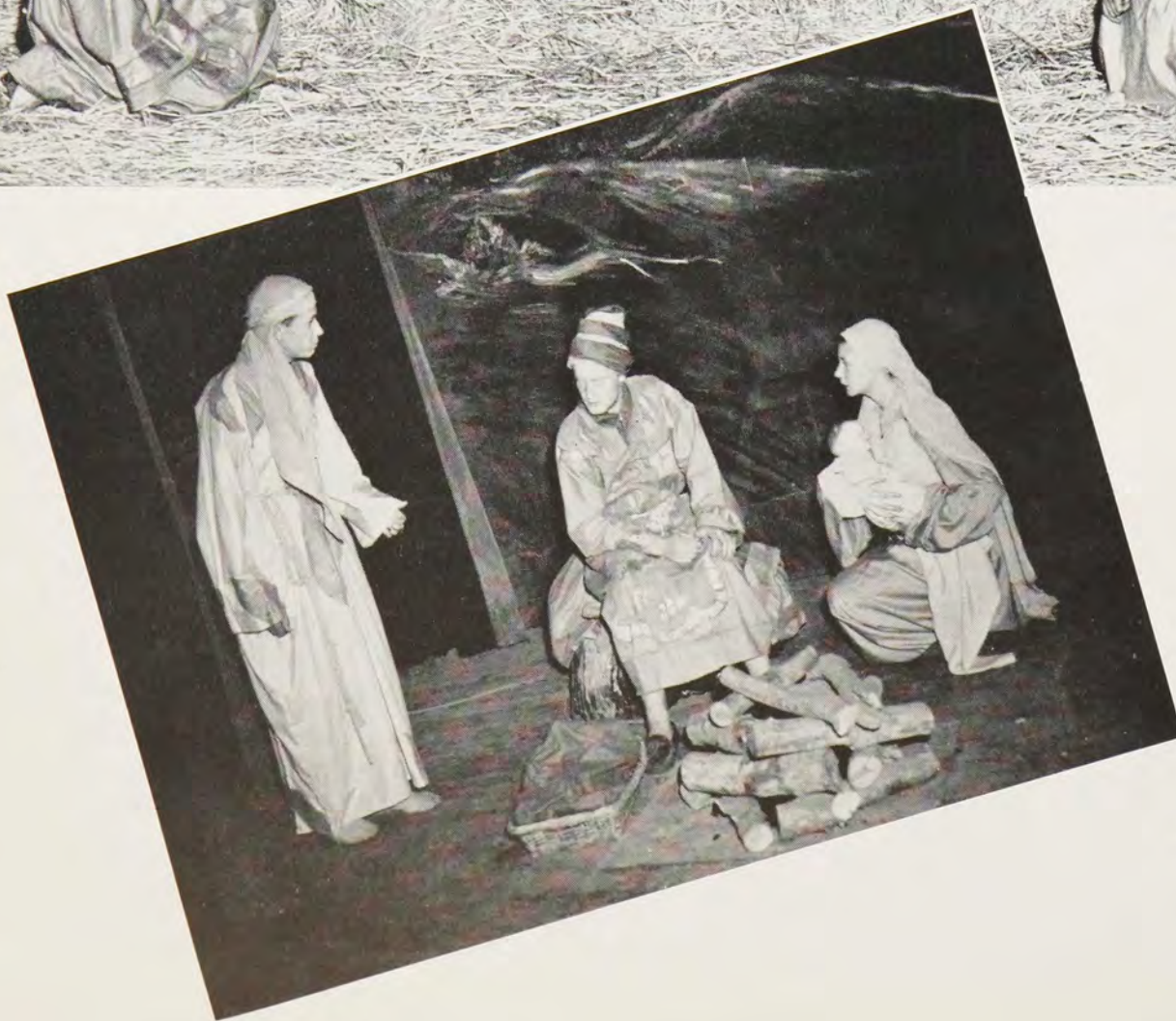

Schaar completed seven of nine passes for one hundred fourteen yards as six Wildcats crossed into pay dirt.

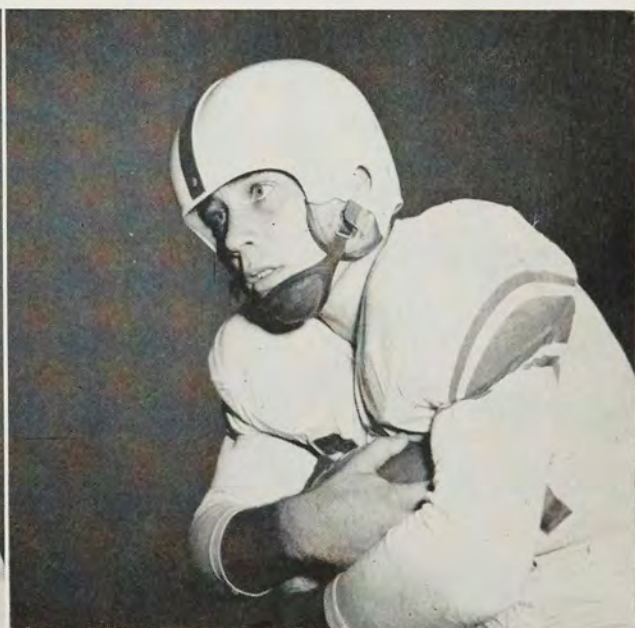
