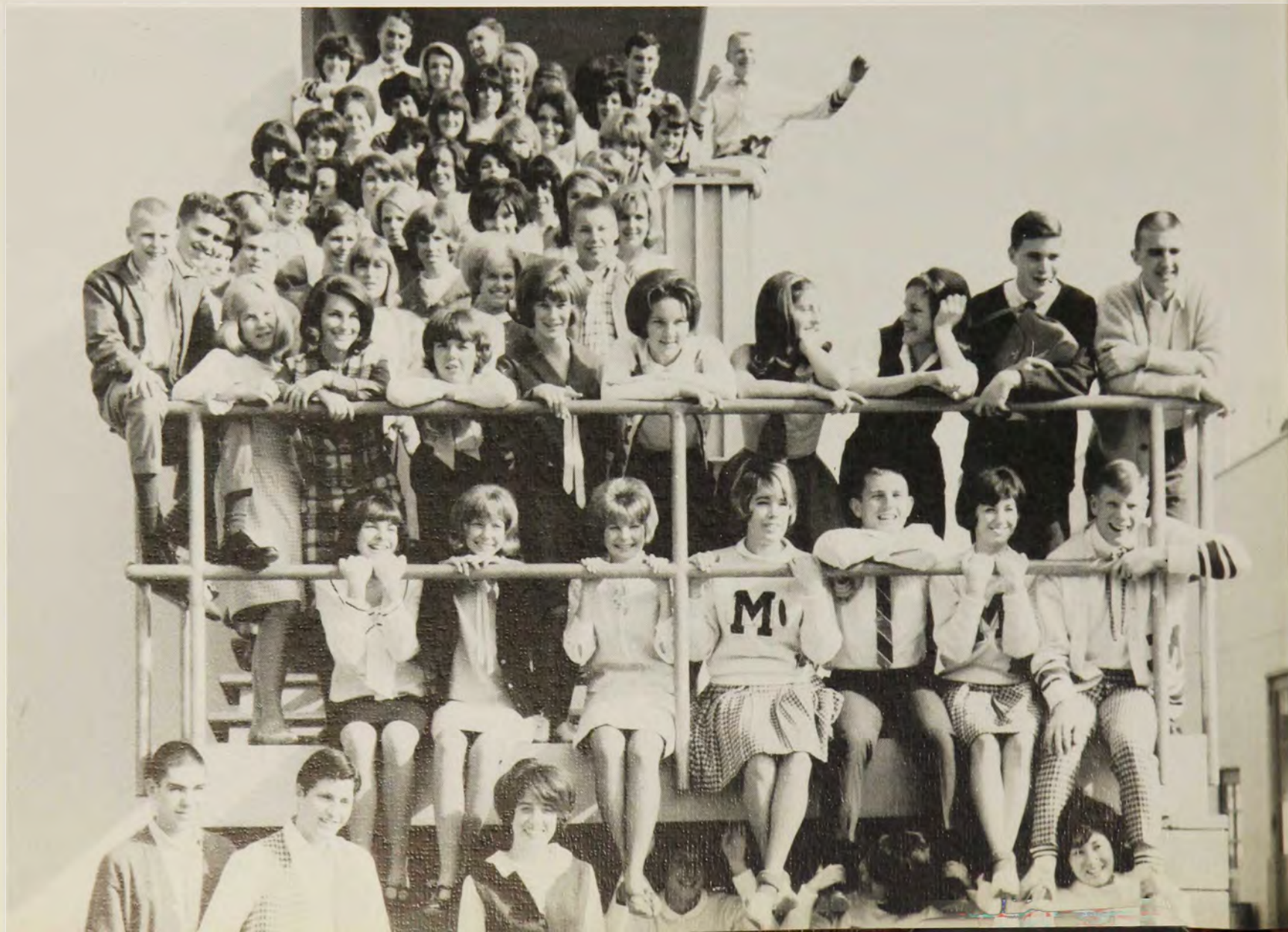
# Publicity Commission

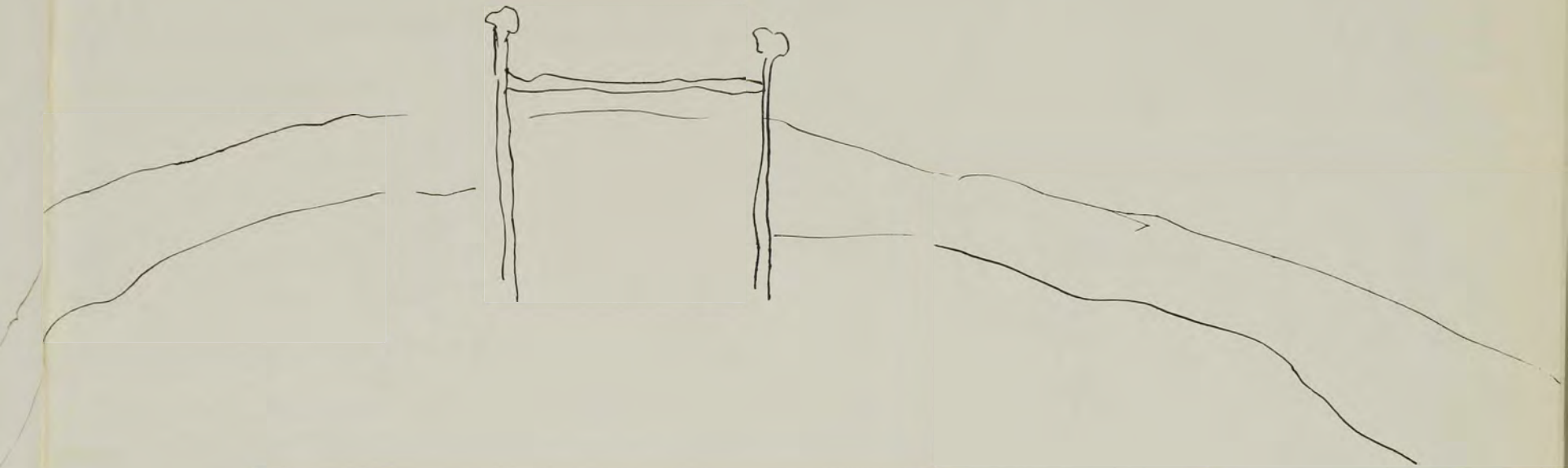

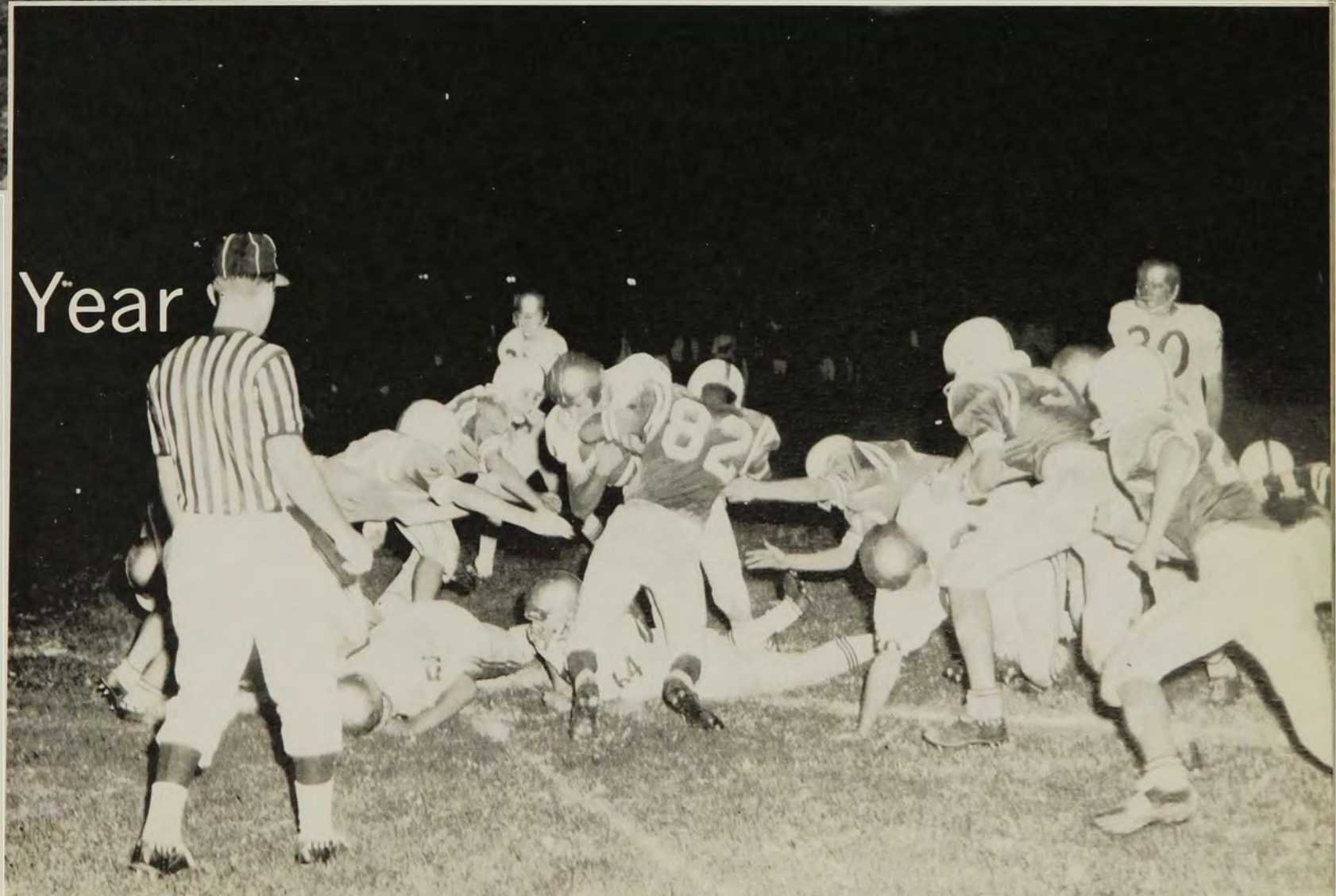
# FOOTBALL 1964

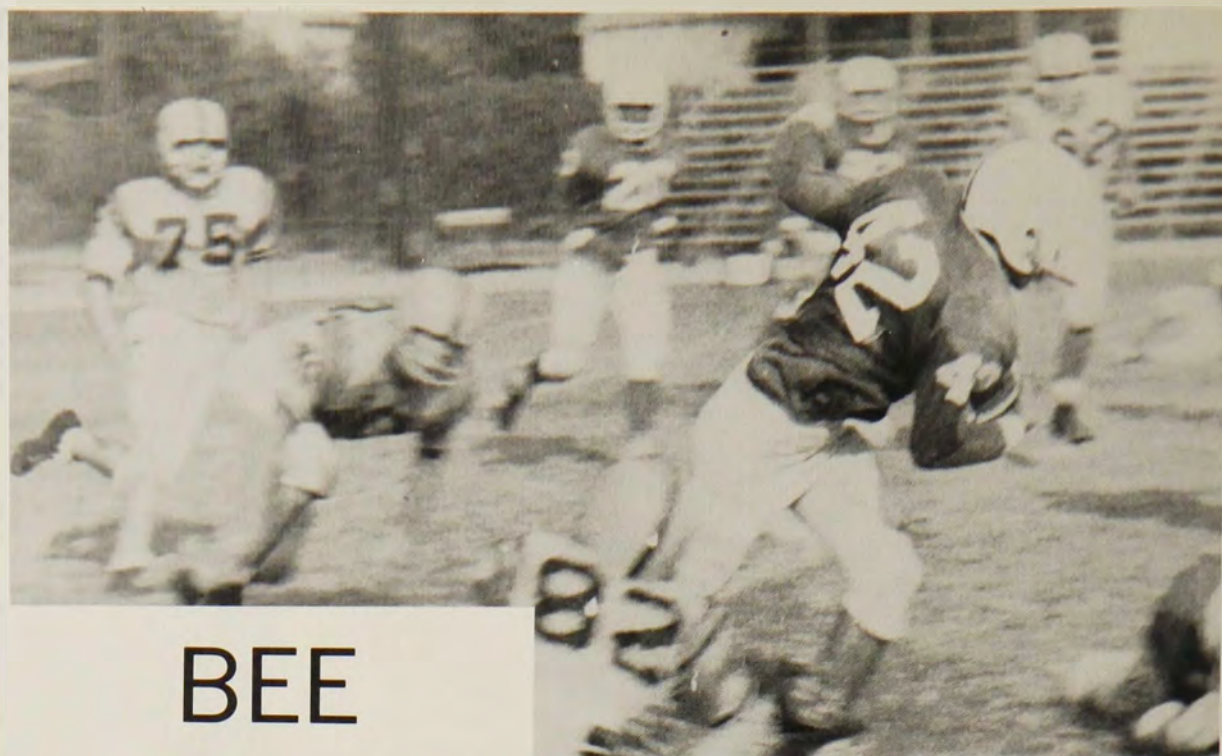

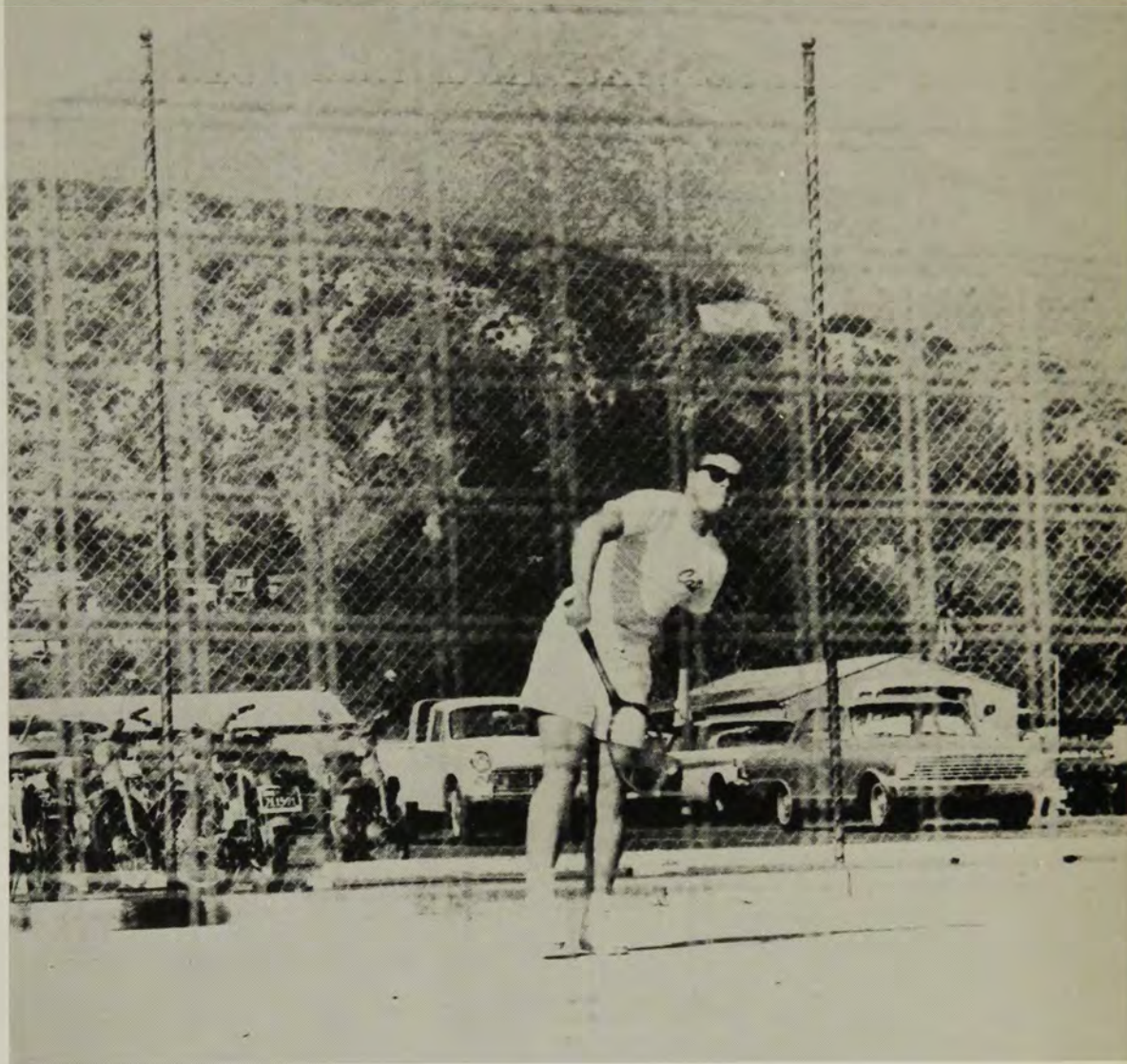

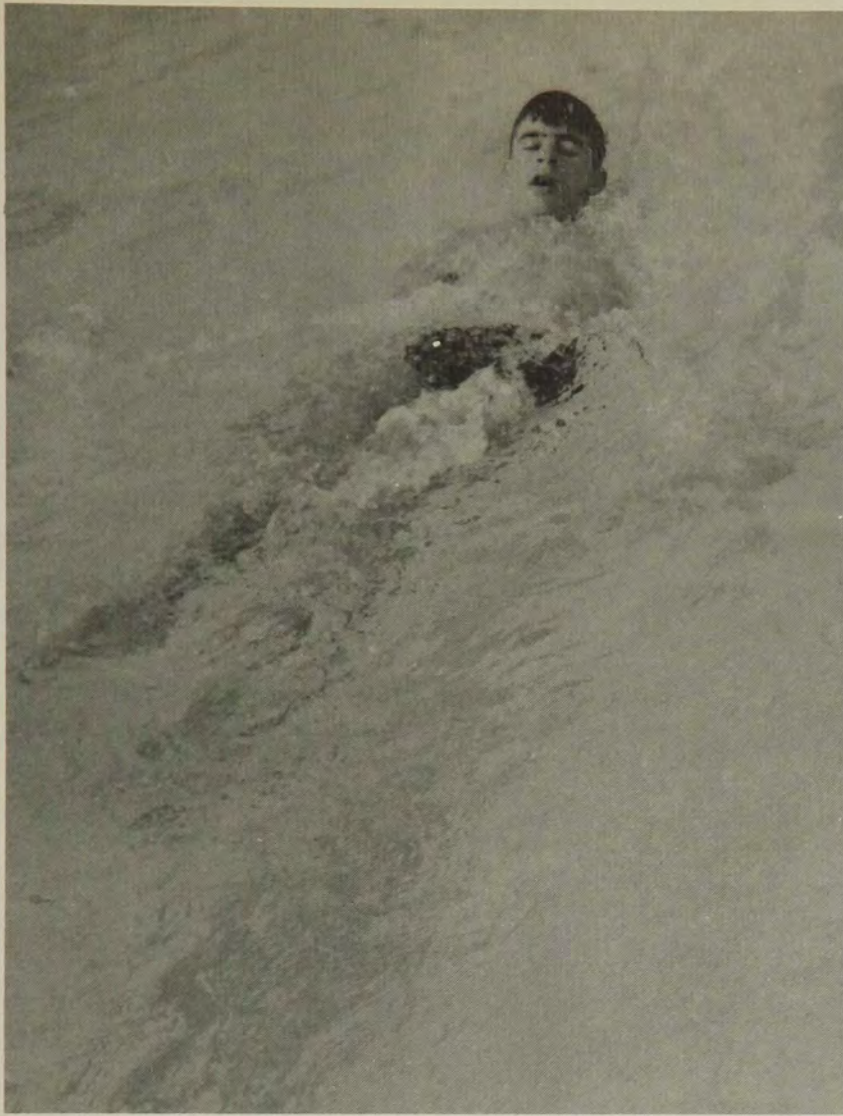


# Swimming

well as Durden and Jarvi.

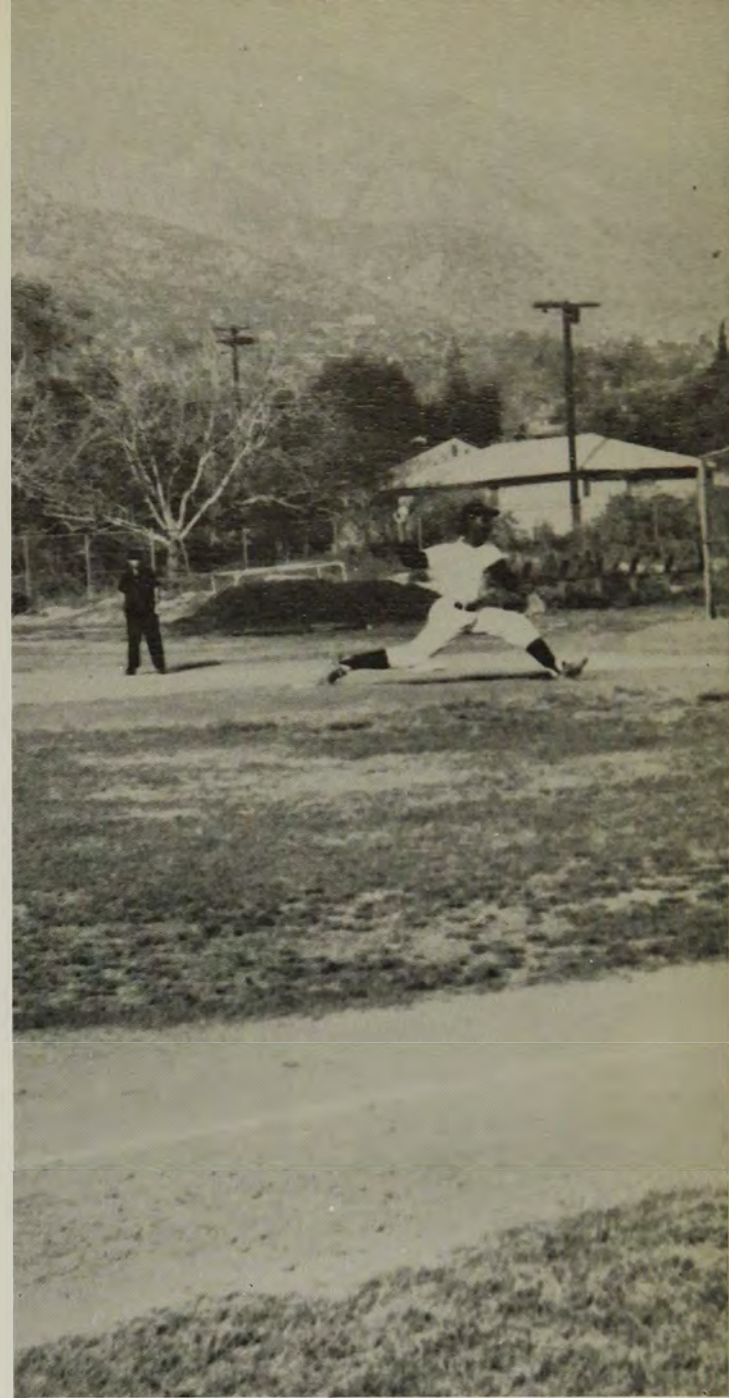

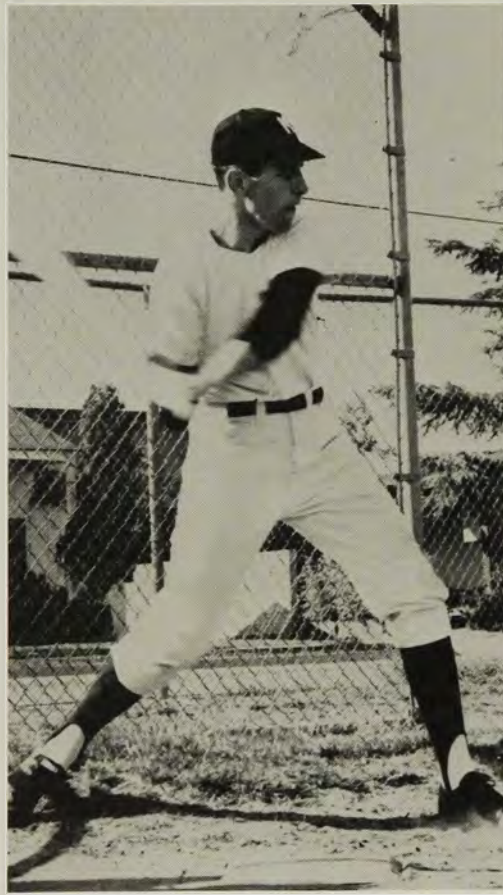
