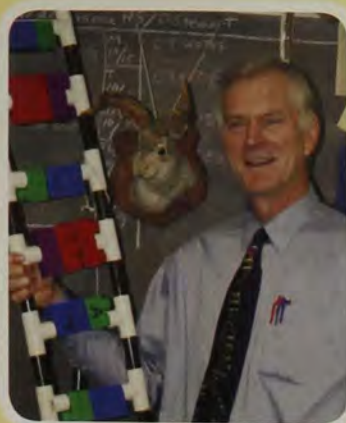

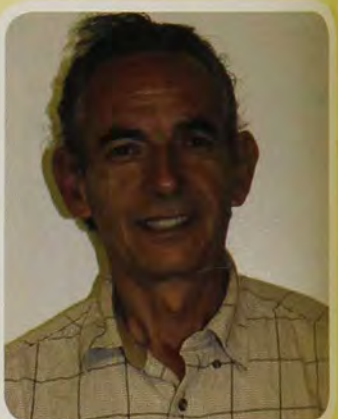

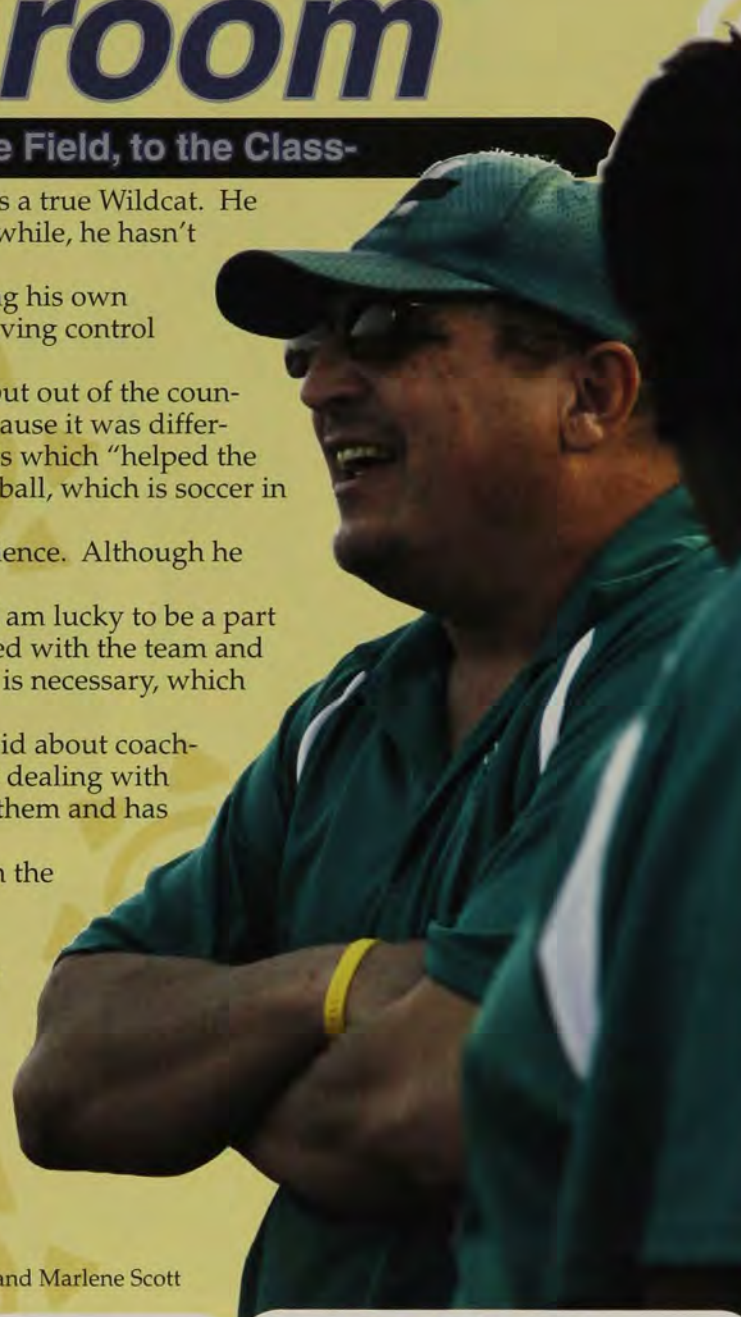
As well as on the field, Mr. Gretebeck is determined to be successful in the classroom. He takes time with students and makes sure that they try hard.

Juniors Weird Talents

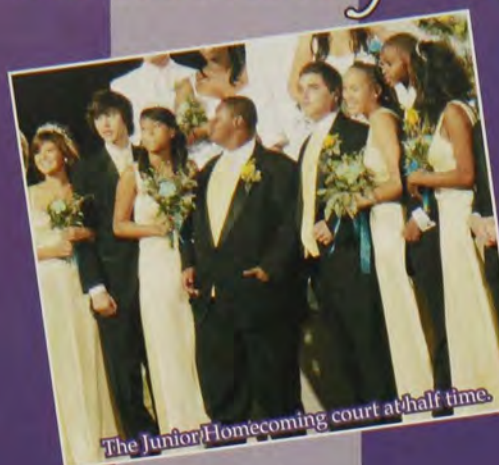
