OMENA'S LEGACY OF SERVICE:

A COMMON BOND



GEORGE ARMSTRONG CUSTER, GEN. UNION ARMY, CIVIL WAR

Though General Custer never lived in Omena, he visited, and owned land through inheritance from his wife's father, Daniel Bacon. Judge Bacon's daughter, Libbie Bacon Custer, was niece to Aaron Page, civil war veteran, and Abel Page, Omena real estate investor. She was cousin to Rebecca Richmond, who built the Bonnie Banks and Camp Lookout cottages.

BENJAMIN HARRISON GRIERSON, GENERAL UNION ARMY, CIVIL WAR, WESTERN TERRITORIES

"Grierson's Raid" moved 1700 men 600 miles through Mississippi destroying Confederate supplies and infrastructure along the way and is credited with turning the tide of the Civil War to a Union Victory. His distinguished career included leading the Black 10th cavalry, known as "Buffalo Soldiers" in the Western Campaign, to map, lay telegraph cable, and build roads.

- Brevet Major General Grierson was the first post Commander of Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, a frontier fort that provided protection to civilians and Indians, protecting various tribes against intrusion by Sooners.
- The General retired to his "Garrison" in Omena, where he passed away in 1911.





BYRON M. CUTCHEON, GENERAL, UNION ARMY, CIVIL WAR

- Byron Cutcheon was an 1861 graduate of the U of M, and joined the 20th Michigan Infantry in 1862. In fall of 1864 he was commissioned Colonel of the 27th Michigan Infantry. In 1865 he resigned as Brevet Brigadier General, having served in the battles of the Wilderness, Spotsylvania, and Petersburg. He was awarded the Medal of Honor.
- While serving in the U.S. Congress Cutcheon submitted a bill to establish the Gettysburg National Military Park to commemorate both the North and South in the Civil War.
- In 1896 he built his Omena Cottage, "Maplewood".

Pvt. Payson Wolfe, Union Army,Civil War, Company K,1st. Michigan Sharp Shooters

Payson enlisted in Company K on August 3, at Northport. Company K was the largest all - Indian regiment east of the Mississippi, with 139 Anishnaabe out of 146 men. They fought in the battles of the Wilderness, Spotsylvania, and Crater. Payson was taken prisoner at Petersburg, Va. on June 17, 1864, and sent to Andersonville Prison. He was discharged at Camp Chase, Ohio, June 13, 1865. (Research by Chris Czopek.)

Clarence "Bud" Burnside Wolfe, Tech Sgt. US Army Air Force, WWII

Bud was born in Aghosatown in 1917, the great-grandson of Payson Wolfe. Bud's military service was in Iwo Jima and Saipan.



Pvt. Aaron Sahgahnahquato Pequongay, Union Army, Civil War

 Aaron Sahgahhnahquato Pequongay, an Ottawa, was recruited by Payson Wolfe, and enlisted with John Jacko and John Kiniewahasoipi for one year. He was assigned to the 1st Michigan Sharpshooters, Co K. They served in the Petersburg Va. area. Payson and Aaron survived the war, and Aaron was discharged at the end of the war in August 1865. Aaron's uncle, Thomas Kah-gee served in Co K also.



Aaron Page, Pvt, Co E, 72 Illinois Infantry, Union Army, Civil War

Aaron Page was an early settler in Omena. He was the first postmaster in Northport, and then in Omena. He was married to Almira Dame and was uncle to Libbie Bacon and by marriage to George A. Custer. He acquired his Omena land (now Page Lane) from the Bacon estate.

Page was an ardent abolishionist and champion of voting rights for Native Americans. III health caused by his Civil War service kept him from continuing to farm in Omena, and he moved to Colorado to work for a mining company. His Colorado grave finally received a marker in 2012 due to the efforts of his descendant, Michael Page, pictured here wearing a reproduction Union Army sack coat and kepi.







THOMAS MILLER, Union Army, Civil War Co. K, 1st MI. Sharpshooters

Thomas enlisted at Northport for 3 years in 1863. Thomas' native name was Thomas Kah-gee; his father's names were Thomas K. Miller and Henry Kah-gee. His parents were married at Old Mission by Rev. Dougherty. He is buried in the Omena Presbyterian Church cemetery. He became seriously ill before his first battle, and Mower Hospital in Philadelphia gave him 20 days leave to recover at home. He died while on leave. He was thought to be a deserter, but was not. Thomas is buried in the Omena Presbyterian Church cemetery.

James Frazier, Pvt. Virginia, POW 1863. Brother in Law of Thomas McLean, father of Mary Frazier







Capt. Samuel A. McClelland, Union Army, Civil War


Lt. Samuel A. McClelland was commissioned in November, 1861. He was injured at the Battle of Malvern Hill in July, 1862, and was promoted to Captain September 16, 1864. He served in Battery G, New York 1st. Light Artillery. Captain McClelland's unit served at Antietam; Fredericksburg; Gettysburg; Spotsylvania Courthouse; Petersburg, Virginia; and Weldon Railroad, Virginia, before being mustered out at Elmira, New York on June 19, 1865.

Captain McClelland is buried in the Omena Cemetery.











JOHN RUFLI Spanish American War

John Rufli enlisted June 6, 1898, Co C. Regulars Michigan Infantry, 35th Regiment.

John later joined the US Life Saving Service, which merged into the Coast Guard in 1915. He served in Holland, Michigan.

Mary McLean Frazier, USANC Spanish American War

Daughter of James Frazier, Civil War Veteran, Mary trained as a nurse in her uncle Thomas McLean's hospital in Cincinnati.

Mary was among the first group of women nurses to serve in the US Army, first as a contract nurse, then as a full member of the military.

The Secretary of War on June 20, 1899, established the Army Nurse Corps and defined the duties and privileges of the Corps. Mary earned a military pension of her own, not as a spouse. Mary was a founding member of the Omena Women's Club.




Albert Luke Freeland, US Army, Spanish American War, Pvt. Co A Regiment 1, Illinois Infantry

Born in Hungary, Albert served in Puerto Rico. He and Mary met in Chicago after the war, and were married in 1902. Mary was called to Omena to nurse her uncle Thomas McLean is his final illness, and determined that she and Albert would return to Omena to raise their family.


In 1907, with \$80 and children ages 3 and 1, they arrived by boat and established the Freeland Resort in Omena.

Following his discharge in 1945 he went to Wayne State University where he established Veterans' coun seling service and two years later started a mental health clinic in the University Student Health Service.

Herbert Everett Holmes, Sgt. US Army WWII, POW

Herb entered service October 9, 1942 and served side by side with his twin brother, Bob in the North African Theater in Italy. They were separated during hand-tohand combat in battle. Bob knew that Herb was alive as he was not among the dead. Herb spent 7 months as a German prisoner at Stalag 4A Hohnstein, until escaping with a handful of men who walked 40 kilometers to the American lines. Johnny T. Brown saved his life, carrying Herb when he could no longer walk.

Herb and Dorothy Benjamin were married on December 28, 1945.

Beatrice Bouchard McLogan was born on July 27, 1923 and died on February 23, 2016 at age of 92. Bea supported the war effort by joining the Navy as an officer in the WAVES, (Women Accepted to Voluntary Emergency Services). She received communications training at Smith College and Mr. Holyoke College. Sometimes she dropped off very sensitive documents to the White House which may have been destined for the War Room. The WAVES program was created in August 1942 in response to the need for additional military personnel during World War II. From the very beginning, the WAVES were an official part of the Navy; and its members held the same rank and rating as male personnel. The navy provided cryptology classes at several colleges for some WAVES. Those whose test scores were high were sent straight to work in Washington, D.C. Women accepted into the cryptologic field were sworn to secrecy, and the penalty for discussing their work outside proper channels ---considered to be an act of treason in time of war-could be death. Bea was fond of telling people who interviewed her over the years that "for every woman who joined the WAVES, the Navy could put a man at sea?"



BEATRICE BOUCHARD, ENSIGN, US NAVY, WAVES, WWII

Beatrice Bouchard graduated from college in 1944. After communication training in the WAVES, she was stationed in the office of the Chief of Naval Operations in Washington, DC. She frequently hand delivered documents to the White House.

Bea said: "For every woman who joined the WAVES, the Navy could put a man at sea."

Bea married college sweetheart Lt. Ted McLogan after the war. Bea Bouchard and Ted McLogan were Mary Ziegeler's parents.

LIEUTENANT EDWARD A. MCLOGAN

Lieutenant Edward A. McLogan is inducted into the Ranger Hall of Fame for his exemplary conduct and actions in combat while serving with the 5307th Composite Unit Provisional (Merrill's Marauders) in Burma in World War II. As a platoon leader he repeatedly risked his life railying his men to stand off repeated Banzai attacks. At the Battle of Nhpum Ga, while the Marauders were surrounded for two weeks, at one time he pulled his men back 100 yards, booby trapped their former foxholes, and strategically positioned his men so that when the enemy attacked, they were completely surprised. After repeated attacks by the enemy and flerce hand-to-hand engagements, the Japanese retreated leaving over 50 bodies behind. After this action, the Marauders nicknamed it McLogan's Hill in his honor. Prior to volunteering for a dangerous and hazardous mission behind enemy lines with the Marauders, Lieutenant McLogan served with the 35th Infantry Regiment in battles in the South Pacific at Guadalcanal and his platoon was selected to lead the way in the first wave of the invasion of the Soloman Islands at the Beach Head. He exemplifies the code of the Army Rangers in leading the way, and is a credit to his country and his unit. His awards include the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, and the Presidential Unit Citation.

Ted McLogan graduated from U of M in 1942. From ROTC he joined the 25th division in Guadalcanal and the Solomon Islands as a 2nd. Lt.

Ted volunteered to join a long range penetration unit behind enemy lines in Burma as one of Brig Gen. Frank Merrill's "Marauders". The unit had no motorized vehicles and walked nearly 1000 miles to conduct guerilla warfare against the Japanese. Lt. Mclogan was awarded the Bronze Star and Purple Heart.

Ted and Bea Bouchard were Mary Ziegeler's parents.

GORDON HERBERT SOLLE, SGT. US ARMY WWII

Sgt. Gordon Solle was stationed with SHAEF, Supreme Headquarters, American Expeditionary Force. He stood guard outside the red schoolhouse headquarters of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower at Reims, France, when Germany unconditionally surrendered to the Western Allies on May 7, 1945.

JULIUS G. MUSOLF, US NAVY Seabee, WWII

Julius loved the "can do" spirit of the Seabees. His most rewarding assignment was the time that he spent as commissary man 2nd. class on Midway Island.

An actress from the visiting USO tour came to the kitchen looking for something to eat. Julius

provided a meal, and she asked him to join her, just the two of them. The actress was Betty Grable.

• Pfc. Stanley Morgan served in the Pacific Theater with the 542nd EBSSR from 1943- 1945. He was trained as an Amphibious Engineer and as Military Police.

• Pvt. Delia Morgan was trained at Lowry Field, Co. as an Air Force Photographer and was a specialist in controlled mosaics – making maps from aerial photographs.

• The Morgans were married at the time of Delia's enlistment in 1943.

- Lt. Joan Smith served as a nurse transporting American soldiers home from Europe and German prisoners on the return.
- Charles "Bud" Van Pelt was a photographer in the 2nd Combat Camera Unit assigned to the 20th Bomb Command in Kharagpur, India. He flew bombing missions in the Pacific Theater, to China, Manchuria, Japan, and others.
- Joan and Bud met and corresponded during the war and were married in the Omena Presbyterian Church in 1946.





Capt. Waldo Abbot Jr. US Army WWII, commanded a truck platoon moving supplies on the China Road. 60% of the soldiers providing transport on the road were Black.

Waldo had the misfortune/fortune to have a burst appendix. He met a spunky Lt. from West Virginia who was his surgical nurse, Lt. Neva Pingley.

Lt. Neva Gray Pingley USANC WWII, came from the mountains of West Virginia to join the Army Nurse Corps during World War II. Deployed to India as a surgical nurse, Ping lived for three years in a tree house in the jungle. Upon her return to the States, Ping traveled alone by train and ice truck to meet Captain Waldo Abbot's family in Omena.

John Reister, US Army Vietnam War, Thailand, married to Ellen Graf • Citation: Sgt Porter, a member of Company G, distinguished himself by conspicuous gallantry and outstanding courage above and beyond the call of duty in action against the enemy. Advancing under cover of intense mortar and artillery fire, two hostile platoons attacked a combat outpost commanded by Sgt. Porter, destroyed communications, and killed two of his three man crew. Gallantly maintaining his position, he poured deadly accurate fire into the ranks of the enemy, killing 15 and dispersing the remainder. After falling back under a hail of fire, the determined foe reorganized and stormed forward in an attempt to overrun the outpost. Without hesitation, Sgt. Porter jumped from his position with bayonet fixed, and meeting the attackers in close combat killed six hostile soldiers and routed the attack. While returning to the outpost he was killed by an artillery burst.

Once Safi was secured, Lt. Anderson was stationed at Casablanca as a shore patrol officer. While in Casablanca, he took over 12,000 photos, most of which he developed himself.



George W. Anderson US Army, Korea Signal Supply Sergeant

• George Anderson served with the US Army in Korea, with the 17th Infantry Regiment, the most highly decorated unit in Korea, and the only American company to have crossed the Yalu. He arrived at the time of the stalemate, serving at Pusan, Koje Do, and the Iron Triangle. His company lost 1500 men in six days at Pork Chop Hill. As signal supply sergeant, he worked under fire to keep supplies moving day and night. George was awarded the Bronze Star for valor. He returned home in 1953.

Geddes Warren Carrington, USMC, WWII 1st Lt. 1st Marine Division South Pacific

A communications officer in the 1st Marine Division, Ged fought in two major battles: Okinawa and Peleliu Island, where he was injured by grenade shrapnel, which he bore for the rest of his life. He was awarded The Purple Heart and the Bronze Star for his bravery.

John Boden Smart, married Ged's daughter, Judy. John served in the US Army National Guard, Military Police, 1968-1974.






2ND LT. KAREN PUTNAM FUGATE, US Air Force, Vietnam Era




Harold was Legal Yeoman aboard the USS Montrail, and the Captain's designated ship communicator.

William Edward Bader Specialist 5th Class US Army Vietnam KIA




Sp.5 Bader entered the service in December 1967, in the Airborne Division Artillery, 101st Division.
