Annette P Anderson Deibel was born in Bay City, Michigan, to the late Oscar M. and Florence (Presley) Anderson on February 22, 1925. After graduating from Bay City Central High School in 1943, Annette went on to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree in Geography from the University of Michigan in 1946. Independent minded, she then moved to Toledo, Ohio, where she worked at the Headquarters for the National Exchange Club of America, then to Detroit, honing a natural skill as a professional shopper for Hudson's Department Store.

Annette married childhood sweetheart Gilbert Deibel on April 30, 1949. Annette and Gil enjoyed 62 years of marriage and had three children: Andrea Deibel Muladore, Laura L. Deibel, and Roxanne M. Deibel. For a short time after marriage, Annette worked at the Junior Chamber of Commerce and the University of Michigan Extension Office in Saginaw.

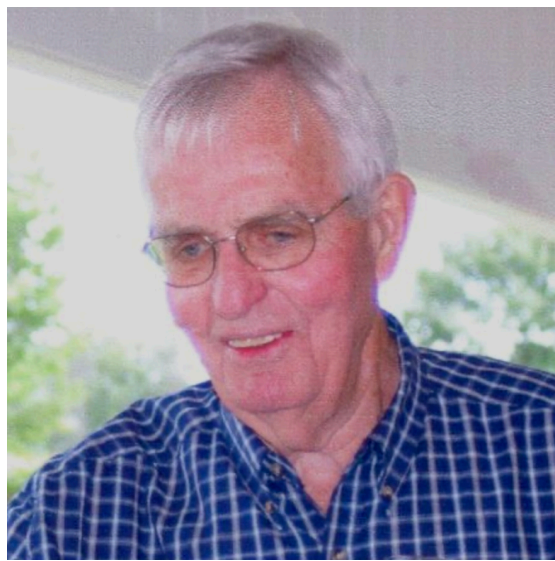
During the time they lived in Saginaw, Annette was active in many organizations, among them the Junior League of Saginaw, the American Association of University Women, and the Saginaw Chapter of Lawyers' Wives, and she volunteered for the American Red Cross. Annette also served on the Board of Directors of the Saginaw Symphony Women's Association; and was a trustee of Delta College for 19 years, following in her father's footsteps. She was also active in the Michigan Community College Association, serving as its President from 1983 to 1984.

After Gil retired and they moved to Omena, Annette continued her community support. She was a member of the Omena Women's Club, the Omena Wine & Literary Society, the Walkie Talkies Club, and the Omena Presbyterian Church. She was a supporter of Inland Seas Education Association, the Leelanau Conservancy, Northport Community Arts Association, the Omena Women's Club, and ShareCare of Leelanau. Summer musical soirees benefitting the Traverse Symphony Orchestra were held numerous times in her Omena home.

Annette Anderson Deibel died on a cloudless sunny day at her home in Omena on April 6, 2024, shortly after a zoomed 99th birthday party with 99 of her closest friends arranged by Sue Anderson and Gina Harder, her "Nicey Nieces,". Annette's survivors

include her daughters Andrea, Laura, and Roxanne, sons-in-law Michael D. Muladore and Charles A. Hodson, and her grandchildren Meagan D. Muladore, Erik M. Muladore, Katherine D. Fox, Linnea C. Hodson, and Evan E. Hodson. Also very close to Annette were her “Nicey Nieces” Sue and Gina, and her “fourth daughter,” Jerilyn Brown, whose thoughtful attentions and friendship spanned over forty years, and longtime friend and her helper Chris Kimmerly.

Kenneth G. Joynt was born on September 5, 1929 in Traverse City, to Adelbert and Praxedes "Sadie" (Brzezinski) Joynt. He was the oldest of five children, sisters Margaret and Adele, and brothers, Herb, and Bob.

Ken graduated from Cadillac High School in 1948. He would later attend Ferris Institute Business School. He also was trained in an engine rebuilding program and Harrison Radiator repair school.

In January 1951, Ken enlisted into military service as an Army Engineer, completing basic training at Ft. Hood. He was then deployed to Germany as part of the 17th Engineer Battalion, 2nd Armored Division NATO defense forces. He was responsible for building supply line bridges across the Rhine River. Ken was honorably discharged in 1952.

A year later, Ken married his high school sweetheart, Lucille "Babe" Bourassa in Cadillac. Ken worked in the family's automotive businesses (AH Joynt Inc. and Cadillac Automotive Warehouse) working many locations with his father and brothers. He sold the automotive business around 1990, and soon ventured into residential contracting, building a few spec homes and one of his own.

Ken loved northwestern Michigan. He was a member of St. Ann Catholic Church, Cadillac Elks Lodge, American Legion, and others. Ken served on many local Cadillac organizations: Cadillac Downtown Development Authority (Charter Chairman), Cadillac Economic Council, Cadillac Community Foundation and others. He was member of the Cadillac Country Club for most of his adult life. He enjoyed playing golf, tennis, and hunting as well as his residential remodeling projects. Like his father, he instilled a solid work ethic.

In 2008 Ken's wife, Lucille, died. In 2010, Ken married Elaine Keller and moved to "Keller Farms". Having grown up on a farm in Traverse, Ken enjoyed his time at the farm with Elaine. They liked to spend time with family in the summers and enjoyed some

time in Sarasota, Florida in the winter. Ken died August 30, 2024 at Sunnyside Senior Living Facility in Cadillac. He was 94.
